

THE TWO SHORTEST PASTORATES

From April 13, 1967 until July 1968, my pastorate was <u>Ringgold Baptist Church</u>, <u>Ringgold</u>, <u>Virginia</u>. Not only did I pastor the church, I taught psychology at <u>Averett College</u>, Danville, and did graduate study at Duke University. An unexpected invitation came in early Spring 1968 to return to Kentucky and join the faculty at <u>Eastern Kentucky University</u>. Both Sue and I felt this was the call of God. The experience at EKU included serving as an administrator in the College of Education, a position that prepared me for my academic leadership role in the early years of <u>Liberty University</u>, the presidency at <u>Northeastern Bible College</u> (NJ) and to lead the <u>Transnational Association of Christian Colleges</u> and Schools (TRACS) eleven years as the first full-time Executive Director.

The following excerpt is taken from THE HISTORY OF RINGGOLD BAPTIST CHURCH: "On April 13, 1967, the church extended a call to Rev. Jim G. Henry, a Tennessean, working in Berea KY with the schools and pastor of the Kerby Knob Baptist Church. The Henrys (Sue and the 3Ms-Mona, Mark, and Melody) moved to Ringgold on May 31, 1967. During his fifteen-month ministry in the church, the church experienced significant growth with 45 additions, 29 by baptism. Sunday School enrollment increased from 265 to 376 with the weekly average 235, and in August, 1968, achieved its goal of becoming a Standard Sunday School within the Southern Baptist Convention, Special mission offerings also increased to record highs. Additionally, 24% of regular tithes and offerings were given to world missions through the Cooperative Program. The church also supported the work of the associational mission program on a monthly budgeted basis. In 1967, the Ringgold Baptist Reflector, a weekly paper, began publication during this time and was distributed into more than 400 homes. A Church Council was formed. Another highlight involved Sue Henry's directing the Christmas drama, "They That Sit in Darkness," with more than 100 persons participating.

"On June 30, 1968, Roy N. Ford, Jr., who had been licensed by the church in November 1961 to preach the Gospel, was duly ordained into the ministry. A month later, Rev. Henry announced his resignation and he accepted a professorial appointment at **Eastern Kentucky University**, Richmond. The church had been sharing its pastor with **Averett College**, Danville as he taught psychology classes there."

The July Reflector cover is from the Ringgold Baptist Church Sunday bulletin, February 4, 1968. Note the hands folded in prayer as you read and reflect on the article written by our pastor, the late Don Edwards, at Southeast Baptist Church, Murfreesboro, Tennessee, as you approach Independence Day 2019.

When the invitation came to serve at <u>Lynchburg Baptist College</u> (now <u>Liberty University</u>), I held an administrative position at EKU and was serving as pastor of the <u>Hays Fork Baptist Church</u>, a church organized in 1819. My first Sunday was April 1, 1971 and my last Sunday was May 19, 1972.

Sue and I were able to celebrate the 200th Anniversary on Sunday, June 23. Fortunately, I had kept weekly bulletins and Reflectors from Hays Fork during the brief fourteen months and these were presented to the church archives. As was true at Ringgold, we had no question that moving to Lynchburg was God's appointment. Only those who were there can understand the sacrifices the early faculty, administrators, staff, and students made during these pioneer days, days greatly blessed by the Lord whom we served.

Nation's future in our hands Folded hands in prayer.

In early May 1993, headlines in the Murfreesboro (TN) newspaper heralded the news that there would be no prayer in the graduation ceremonies at local high schools. Just prior to that, the Nashville papers reported that prayer was removed from the commencement services at Tennessee State University due to the objection of a Hindu professor. It was that context that provoked our pastor at Southeast Baptist Church and one of the JGHM board members, to pen the words that follow in The Messenger, our weekly church paper, on May 25, 1993. Pastor Don Edwards, (now in Heaven) expressed the burden of my heart. America needs prayer as never before.

Our greatest challenge as a nation is before us. Somehow we have moved from protecting the individual's right to worship as he sees fit, to protecting the

public from anything Christian. That is not what our founding fathers intended. We have forgotten that we were founded as a Christian nation. God's laws were the basis for most of our laws. James Madison was quoted as saying, We have staked the whole future of American Civilization not upon the power of government, far from it. We have staked the future of all our political institutions upon the capacity of each and all of us to govern ourselves according to the Ten Commandments of God.

There now seems to be groups of people who want to remove any and all acknowledgments of God and His influence in our nation. The truth is, our decline as a nation began when those efforts started. A nation cannot ignore God and expect to be blessed. We are now leading the western world in violent crimes, divorce, teen pregnancies, abortions, illegal drug use, and illiteracy.

The ironic thing is that the one thing that could turn this around is the very thing that is under attack now. Prayer is our only hope. Not a watered down prayer that acknowledges nothing, a prayer of recognition to the Almighty God, Creator of the Universe, and Judge of us all is the only thing that is going to save us.

We must ask again what Abraham Lincoln asked: Not is God on our side but are we on God's side? We who are Christians must take a stand. Prayer must be important in all our lives. We must not be asked to pray in public. People in restaurants need to see that prayer is important to us. People at work need to know prayer is our way of life. And yes, young people, you can pray in school. Bow your head before a test or a sporting event. Acknowledge that God is the source of all even when you are eating in the school cafeteria. We can make a difference. We may have to be bolder than we have in the past. The stakes are high. Our nation's future is in our hands—folded hands in prayer.

UNDERSTANDING THE TIMES

The faith of our forefathers has a story to tell to us in 2019. One matter of debate the past several years deals with a question. Is the United States a Christian nation founded upon biblical principles?

Let's see what some of our forefathers have said about it.

JOHN ADAMS Second U. S. President and signer of the Declaration of Independence. "The fourth day of July, 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated, as the Day of Deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever." Adams wrote this in a letter to his wife, Abigail, on July 3, 1776.

JOHN HANCOCK First signer of the Declaration of Independence. Resistance to tyranny becomes the Christian and social duty of each individual. ... Continue steadfast and, with a proper sense of your dependence on God, nobly defend those rights which heaven gave, and no man ought to take from us." History of the United States of America, Vol. II, p. 229.

SAMUEL ADAMS Signer of the Declaration of Independence and Father of the American Revolution. "And as it is our duty to extend our wishes to the happiness of the great family of man, I conceive that we can better express ourselves than by humbly supplicating the Supreme Ruler of the world that the rod of tyrants may be broken to pieces, and the oppressed made free again; that wars may cease in all the earth, and that the confusions that are and have been among nations may be overruled by promoting and speedily bringing on that holy and happy period when the kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ may be established, and all people everywhere willingly bow to the scepter of Him who is the Prince of peace." As Governor of Massachusetts, Proclamation of a Day of Fast, March 20, 1797.





JOHN WITHERSPOON Signer of the Declaration of Independence, clergyman and president of Princeton University.

"While we give praise to God, the Supreme Disposer of all events, for His interposition on our behalf, let us guard against the dangerous error of trusting in, or boasting of, an arm of flesh ... If your cause is just, if your principles are pure, and if your conduct is prudent, you need not fear the multitude of opposing hosts

"What follows from this? That he is the best friend to American liberty, who is most sincere and active in promoting true and undefiled religion, and she sets himself with the greatest firmness to bear down profanity and immorality of every kind.

"Whoever is an avowed enemy of God, I scruple not to call him an enemy to his country." Sermon at Princeton University, "The Dominion of Providence over the Passions of Men," May 17, 1776.

The need for \$9,000 to cover Martin's van was shared with Ropeholder Doorkeepers. THE FUNDS HAVE BEEN TRANSMITTED. THE VAN IS NOW BEING USED! THANK In 1987, there were two international prayer seminar events. The first was Nigeria (January 19-February 6) and the second was India (November 9-25). Both were memorable and fruitful. To report to the <u>Doorkeepers</u> after the Nigeria seminars (Imo State, Ibo Tribe), a small pictorial booklet was prepared with a Nigerian coin anchoring the cover page. Since one photo is reported to be worth 1,000 words, a replica of the booklet follows. You will see why many Doorkeepers and friends became excited about prayer seminars in other nations.



THE SIN OF PRAYERLESSNESS

In the June issue, Reflector readers were provided a study from the Prayer Seminar on The Sin of Prayerlessness (<u>Session Six of the Prayer Seminar Workbook</u>). Prayerlessness doesn't mean that a believer never prays, it means he is not praying as he should be praying. Prayerlessness was defined as that state in which one prays less than he ought, less than the Father desires, and less than one himself knows that he should. Actually we should be praying about everything. After we become a Christian, we should order our lives around prayer and the Word, no more and no less.

Further, we noted that prayerlessness is a sin, not an area of neglect. Sadly, prayerlessness is a sin against who God is because each element of prayer reveals some aspect of God's essence, His character, and His attributes. It is a sin against the Person of God, the Provision of God, the Purpose and Plan of God, the Pleasure of God, the Power of God, and the Promises of God.

During this study, we want to continue to discuss how it is possible for a believer to be prayerless as a part of his lifestyle. During that study we primarily looked at <u>PRAYERLESSNESS</u> as a sin. In this study, we will deal with <u>PRAYERLESSNESS</u> as a stronghold. A believer will be able to understand what it takes to become a person of prayer when he understands who he is as a person.

HOW IS IT POSSIBLE THAT A BORN-AGAIN PERSON BE PRAYERLESS? PRAYERLESSNESS-A STRONGHOLD

Key verse: "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds; casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ." 2 Corinthians 10:4-5

<u>STRONGHOLD.</u> A stronghold is a system of thought or an area of bondage within the mind or body that encourages the devil to attack. In military language, it would refer to any area where the military is entrenched—a "fortress." It is an area over which the Christian does not have control. Repeating an incident of behavior enough times produces a habit. When a habit is formed the person proceeds without thinking because whatever it is has become a part of his lifestyle. The same is true of a stronghold.

For many years, we featured Dr. Charles Stanley's HANDLE WITH PRAYER (Wheaton: Victor Books, 1982) on the prayer seminar book table and encouraged our participants to add this volume to their libraries. According to a JGHM report entitled Materials Used: Thirty-Two Year Summary

(1986-2018), JGHM distributed 3,955 copies and Dr. Stanley extended his personal gratitude.

A stronghold is an area of sin that has become part of our lifestyle. It may be a harmful habit (drugs, fornication, smoking) or it may be an attitude (rejection, loneliness, worry, doubt)... Satan pumps us full of lies which secure these strongholds. They may sound like this, "There's really nothing wrong with this music — I don't listen to the words anyway." Or, "I just drink a little when I get nervous." And haven't we all said, "The police won't pull me over for going 60 mph, so it's OK?"

Our responsibility as Christians is to tear down these strongholds through Spirit-filled prayers. How? There is only one weapon—the sword of the Spirit. We must fight these lies with God's Word. We must fight specific lies with specific truths. (p 118)

Look carefully at 2 Corinthians 10:4-5. Three words in this passage reveal that strongholds are developed in our minds. I have my students in a prayer seminar to circle the three words in their workbooks, viz., <u>imaginations</u>, <u>knowledge</u>, and <u>though</u>t. So, where in a person are strongholds? Strongholds develop in our minds

In the mid-1960s, God gave me "a best friend." His name was Hugh Bryan Mylam. He and his wife, Carter, lived in Ringgold, a small village near the North Carolina border in southside Virginia. Initially, it was a long distance friendship since we lived

in Berea, Kentucky, 400 miles west. When we relocated to Lynchburg, Virginia in April 1972, we were sixty-eight miles apart! Hugh Bryan's delight was talking about the Bible. Sometimes we talked for hours, went to bed to sleep, only to resume the conversation when we awakened. There were times when he espoused, "You are wrong about that" and then proceeded to quote the relevant Scriptures to prove his contention.

When I casually commented that I wish we had a <u>queen-size</u> bed, it was not long until Hugh Bryan presented us with a <u>king-size</u> bed with side tables, and a huge bureau that he crafted from walnut (trees on his farm). We have been blessed from his craftsmanship for fortyfour years! You should see the beautiful, large roll-top desk he made for us!

One day Hugh Bryan informed us that he and Carter were coming to Lynchburg to spend the weekend with us. We were thrilled! He continued, "You know I'm teaching the senior adults in our church and you know how the seniors are. You teach them one thing and they want to know two. Teach them two things and they want to know three." At that point they were asking two questions: (1) What is the difference in the Bible between spirit, soul and heart? (2) What happens to believers when they die?

My preparation for the upcoming discussion was to ask our seminary dean and two seminary faculty members the questions. After

listening to their answers, I was unclear about the first question. When I explained my dilemma to Hugh Bryan, I stated that we would need to resort to the next best thing. He quickly asked, "And what is the next best thing?" When I told him that we would need to go to the Bible for ourselves. His retort was simple: "Don't you think that is what we should have done anyway?" Actually, I did!

On that Saturday afternoon 1975 in my study in Lynchburg, we found a verse that led us toward understanding the answer to his first guestion. The verse was from Paul in 1 Thessalonians 5:23. This verse explains how God made us. We are a trichotomy, not a dichotomy. The "whole" person is spirit, soul, and body. Basically, Hugh Bryan's question was "Who is a person?" My teaching area was human development and my academic preparation included psychology, anthropology, sociology. From this moment on, I revised my approach to add a spiritual aspect in a much clearer manner. During the time when I began to see the need to know God better, I read widely many books on the subject. I began to understand the place of prayer. Each church is to be known as a praying church. My deep desire was to understand the spiritual side of man as I taught human development to my students at Lynchburg Baptist College (now Liberty University).

After exploring several approaches Hugh Bryan could use to explain to his seniors, we came up

with the idea of using three circles as a teaching paradigm to illustrate. The new teaching paradigm was depicted by using three circles joined together. The big circle represents the body. A circle inside that circle represents the soul ("person" made up of mind, emotion and will), and a smaller circle inside the second circle represents the spirit of man (where the control seat is located). You can see the paradigm in the Prayer Seminar Workbook (p 19). From that day forward. I have used this model and it communicates

Scriptures we chose to use were Genesis 3, John 3, and Romans 5:12-21. You remember that God told Adam that he would die the day he ate the forbidden fruit in the Garden of Eden. Did he die? He did not die physically. He did not die as a person. But he did die. His spirit died to God leaving only self on the throne. In John 3, Jesus had a conversation with Nicodemus. What kind of a new birth did Jesus tell Nicodemus that was necessary to be in a right relationship to God? A physical birth was impossible since a grown person cannot enter the second time into his mother's womb. Jesus was speaking of a spiritual birth.

Because of Adam's sin, the spirit of man died to God. Every person born since Adam has been born dead to God. When a person receives Christ as Savior, his spirit is quickened (made alive) by the Holy Spirit. We call that "born again!" One thing that I learned in the early years of the prayer seminar

ministry, especially teaching in other nations, few Christians understand what happened to them the moment that they trusted Christ as Savior. Consequently, they have no assurance and many think they need to be saved more than once. A list is now included in the Prayer Seminar Workbook: (1) The person's name is written in the Lamb's Book of Life; (2) The Holy Spirit comes to live in the person; (3) the Holy Spirit places him into the Body of Christ (spiritual baptism); (4) the Holy Spirit gives one or more spiritual (charisma) gifts to be used to build up the Body of Christ; and (5) the person is placed on the road to Heaven, his eternal home

To understand strongholds, here is important information. Mind, emotions, will, and body are not born again. A struggle begins and continues since Satan's aim is to nullify the influence of a believer. The explanation Paul gives in Romans 7 sharpens our understanding of the struggle. He explained that when he would do good that evil was with him. "That which I want to do, I don't do. What I do not want to do, I do." But we must never quit reading. He thanks God that he does not have to be defeated. There is victory that comes when we surrender and yield to the Holy Spirit. Most Christians are carnal. A carnal Christian is a Christian where self is in control, not the Holy Spirit.

If a Christian is defeated it will be in the mind. What is in the mind determines one's behavior.

The mind is not born again. We have a sin nature when we are born. From that moment onward, through learning and experiencing, we begin to fill our minds with good things, bad things, and many things that are neither good nor bad. Satan begins to pollute the mind in order to defeat us. He does not let up! Actually, many ungodly things in my mind were learned AFTER I became a Christian. The mind must be protected and renewed (Romans 12:2). This is where the Word of God comes into the picture. When we put God's Word into our minds it will be there when temptations come knocking. The Holy Spirit brings the Word alive and nullifies any influence of the bad things that are in our minds. The strongholds are broken up and have no power to defeat us. For further understanding, there is pertinent information on Page 20 of the Prayer Seminar Workbook.

Someone said that the Holy Spirit uses the six-hour prayer seminar to "whet" appetites for further study. Many have said that the prayer seminar is worth more than two-week revival meetings. From the crucible of experience, I know what happens when we begin to study together the many facets of developing a meaningful, sustained prayer life. you organize a prayer seminar in your area? Adam Nathanson and his team will be eager to share with you. I continue to conduct a limited number of prayer seminars personally.

Understanding, **prayerlessness** is a sin is the starting point to victory.

It happens because Satan has been given a place to stand in your mind until it is a stronghold. You and I don't have to be defeated. The stronghold can be broken up by the Word of God. It is then that you will be on your road to becoming a prayer warrior. Prayer is the work that must come before all other work for the Lord Jesus Christ.

The following is quoted from Dr. Frank Minirth's book, **CHRISTIAN PSYCHIATRY**, pages 63-70 (Old Tappan, NJ: Fleming H. Revell Co., 1977):

Man consists of a body, soul, and spirit. In 1 Thess. 5:23 (NAS), the following is recorded: "Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be preserved complete without blame at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." This is a very significant verse, for it refers to three distinct and separate parts of man. The distinction is not unlike that heard in secular areas where man in totality is referred to as spirit, soul and body. The reference is to the spiritual aspect of man, the psychological aspect of man, and finally the physical aspect. In the above verse, each part is considered

separately and thus, each has different functions; yet they must complement each other to make the whole. The whole of man is again described in a very early portion of Scripture. In Genesis 2:7 (NAS), the following is recorded: "Then the Lord God formed man of dust from the ground [Hebrew word for body is basar], and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life [Hebrew word nwahmah, meaning the human spirit, is used here] and man became a living being [can also be translated "soul"— Hebrew word for soul here is nephesh]." Thus, God combined body plus spirit to form the soul.

The word <u>soul</u> is most often used as a synonym for the person—the self. The innermost aspect of man which is the supernatural part of man given by God at birth is the <u>spirit</u>. The spirit is the organ for communication with God. Note John 4:23. Another important function of the spirit is perception and insight.

One of my favorite contemporary hymns is **In** Christ Alone, written in 2001 by <u>Stuart Townend</u> and <u>Keith Getty</u>, a Nashville, Tennessee resident. An article from the Religious News Service (RNS) began with "Fans of a beloved contemporary Christian

hymn won't get any satisfaction in a new church hymnal. The committee putting together a new hymnal for the Presbyterian Church (USA) dropped the popular hymn "In Christ Alone" because the song's authors refused to change a phrase about the wrath of God. The original lyrics say that "on that cross, as Jesus died, the wrath of God was satisfied." The Presbyterian Committee on Congregational Song wanted to substitute the words, "the love of God was magnified." Some critics felt that the proposed change was sparked by liberals wanting to take God's wrath out of the hymnal.

Timothy George, dean of Beeson Divinity School in Birmingham, Ala., said he worries that the committee dropped the song because the idea of God's wrath has become unpopular. 'I don't see this as an isolated case," he said in a phone interview. "It fits into a wider pattern of downplaying parts of Christian doctrine that are offensive." Mike Harland, the director of LifeWay Worship, the music department of the Nashvillebased publisher affiliated with the Southern Baptists pointed out that the words in a hymnal matter. "The faith of current generations and future generations is shaped by what we say and what we sing," he said. "That's why you stress over every word "

Discovering this document was a reminder that we need to pray for our family. Our nuclear family is now four generations—Sue (Nana) and me, three children (Mona, Mark & Melody), six grandchildren: Emilee Bradshaw Fulcher, Kimberlee Bradshaw, James Henry, Wendy Henry Goodner, Beau Ware, and Jeanne Ware, seven great-grandchildren: (Caleb and Lillian; Maggie; Willow and Stone; Emma; and Ellie). In the Prayer Seminar Workbook, two pages are devote to intercessory praying, pages eight and twenty-nine. Intercession is one of the five elements of prayer, namely <u>A-doration</u>, C-onfession, T-hanksgiving, S-eeking for self (Petition), S-eeking for Others (Intercession). Across the world, we have testimonies from participants in prayer seminars indicating that one of the major lessons learned during a prayer seminar is to learn the elements and use them as a practical way to organize their daily prayer time. While this order might not always be appropriate, it is true that using the A-C-T-S acronym is clearly helpful. For those who have a copy of the Prayer Seminar Workbook, this would

be an excellent time to review the two pages cited dealing with intercession. Page eight deals with prayer as work challenging churches to become praying churches. This only becomes a reality when individual believers are willing to exercise discipline and make prayer a daily priority. Prayer is the work that must come before all other work. Page twenty-nine deals with how to organize intercessory praying.

<u>Intercessory praying is defined</u> as focusing the power of God on a person or on a situation. No prayer list, no prayer life is a main focus. A practical suggestion is given on how to organize the prayer list using daily and the days of the week as headers. On the daily list, pray for your family, your pastor and his family, and the Peace of Jerusalem. During our morning devotions, Sue and I pray for each member of our nuclear family with specific requests that come from our Bible reading that day and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. For example, we recently prayed that each would have a heart for God that day.
