He Is Not Here He Is Risen!

"Suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them ... The men said to them, 'Why do you look for the living among the dead?..." (Luke 24:4-5).

"He is not here; for He is risen, as He said, Come, see the place where the Lord lay" (Matthew 28:6).



This is the divine announcement of the Resurrection. Jesus had left the tomb before the stone had been rolled away. Later He would enter a room with a locked door. The glorified body of Jesus was radically different from the body with which He was born.

"And go quickly, and tell His disciples that He is risen from the dead; and, behold, He goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see Him; lo, I have told you" (Matthew 28:7).

The angelic announcement ceased at this point. From here on the message would be told by human lips. "Come, see ... Go quickly, and tell." But before any individual attempts to witness, he must first have an unshakable conviction of the truth of the Resurrection. He must have settled it in his own mind that Christ died for his sins and was buried "Come, see the place where the Lord lay" and that Christ rose again "He is not here: for He is risen." Then with these convictions, he can "go quickly, and tell." My friend, you and I are to go, and we are to tell.

THE MATTER OF PRAISE AND WORSHIP IN PRAYER

During my time in the air (thirty hours to and from South Africa) and during the stay in South Africa (nineteen days away from home), a major theme for reflection was praise and worship. The only book that I carried with me was ADORATION: PRAYER AS WORSHIP, a book written to supplement the Prayer Seminar Workbook in the area of praise and worship. Incidentally, I was blessed with thoughts given to me when I wrote the book and the gleanings from my studies at that time. Many of you have the book, already, and I encourage you to pull it out and read it again or read it carefully for the first time. If you don't have a copy, I encourage you to request a copy. There is no cost for the book, but we ask that each one who is able contribute \$10 (to cover printing and shipping). However, a gift is not mandatory.

As I look back on my own experience in this area of prayer and the Christian life, I really struggled to understand and put what I was learning into practice. More than any other particular Bible study, I encountered Satanic opposition when I began my journey into the praise life. May I be quick to say that I still have struggles in this area and that is the reason for my decision to revisit praise and worship.

On several occasions during the recent prayer seminars in South Africa, I was deeply moved by the spontaneous expressions of praise and worship when we were singing and praying. Some brothers and sisters walked about with

utterances of praise on their lips. It was contagious and I, too, wanted to verbally praise.

As I pursued the study of praise and worship, I began to understand why the Holy Spirit allowed this struggle. My will was involved. Our natural man must feel like doing something before he does it, but the spiritual man submits his will. without regard for feeling, to God. In practice this means that I must deliberately purpose to praise God. And like faith itself, and everything dealing with God, it springs from a confidence in the Word of God. It believes first, acts on that belief, and feels later. Fact. faith, and feeling, in that order. So you see my problem was thinking that praise was a product of my feelings at any given time, but I was wrong. Praise is triggered by an act of the will. It will be helpful to explore the "will" versus "feelings" matter further. Such a study will bring clarity.

A Workshop on Praise

Some have termed Psalm 95, "A Workshop on Praise." David said, "O come, let us sing to the Lord! Let us shout joyfully to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving; Let us

shout joyfully to Him with psalms (vv 1-2). He continues, "O come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (v 6). What is the lesson? The six "let us" admonitions require an act of the will. How can one obey the "let us" except it be an act of the will?

Rarely was the Psalmist David in circumstances that were conducive to singing, dancing or shouting joyfully. Once when he was fleeing the attempt of his father-in-law, King Saul, to kill him, he said, "My heart is steadfast, O God, my heart is steadfast. I WILL sing, yes, I WILL sing praises." Who feels like singing when he is running for his life? Who can sing when his mouth feels as though it were stuffed with cotton, his stomach squeezed into small knots, and fear almost paralyzing him? But David sang! And God heard him!

A study of David's life will reveal that he had a way of taking his feelings, as well as his intellect, by the collar and telling them to respond to the Spirit. "Soul, praise the Lord!" Once he threatened to humble his soul with fasting and prayer unless it responded. It did!

Physical expressions

Right after I finished Adoration: Prayer as Worship, I was guest of Dr. Gilbert Perez and his congregation in San Antonio, Texas. My responsibilities were to conduct an area-wide prayer seminar on Saturday and to preach in the two morning services on Sunday. The time between the two worship services was reserved for the Sunday school. The pastor informed me that he was teaching a basic

class to new members and the subject for the session was praise. I said I would attend provided he would teach in his normal way and I planned to listen. He agreed.

Remember, I had just written the book and thought I was pretty well settled in my understanding of praise and worship. I had even addressed a couple of the words on his list in my book. His teaching promptly dispelled my confidence. He tauaht about seven Hebrew words translated "praise" in the English Bible, but with different shades of meaning in the Hebrew. As he covered the basic root meanings of each word, he pointed out that most versions simply use "praise" to translate these Hebrew words so rich in meaning. One was "praise the Lord with uplifted hands.

My Southern Baptist tradition that pretty well molded my worldview made no provision for praising with uplifted hands. During my next morning time of Bible reading and the "praise and worship" component, I reluctantly raised my hands. I couldn't believe the joy and the release that came to me. What an accomplishment for me and what a motivator to praise with uplifted hands.

So, what is the word for the month on praise and worship? Think through what has been said about the difference between "an act of the will" and "an act based only on feelings." Try for yourself praising whether you feel like it or not! You will blessed!

Coronation Day BIOGRAPHY OF REV. ONESIMUS B. SULE


Rev. O. Sule was born into the family of Imam Sule of Amonoku village in Kogi State, Nigeria some 85 years ago. As the Imam (Muslim leader) of the village, the senior Sule wanted his son to train in Koranic education and help on the farm, but Onesimus wanted western education and therefore left the village to pursue his dream. He excelled academically.

Rev. O. Sule converted to Christianity in the 1950s and following his baptism, he changed his name from Musa to Onesimus. He and Onesimus in the book of Philemon share a common story of encountering Jesus in their run-away moment.

He enlisted into the Nigerian Police Force in 1955 and did very well as a police detective. He had great zeal and boldness in sharing the gospel. He placed a gospel tract on the desk of his superior officer and without being told who did it, the officer knew the "culprit."

Rev. O. Sule married the late Sarah and their marriage is blessed with 6 children and 12 grand children. Sarah Sule died in 2005 and Rev. Sule married Esther who was truly a helper for Rev. Sule in his last few years on earth.

Rev. Sule felt called into the ministry and he resigned from the police force and took his family straight to Kagoro Bible College without submitting an application to the school. The school has never witnessed such a radical decision and they had to admit him instantly.



Following his graduation from the Bible college **Onesimus** pioneered the ECWA English church in Kaduna. He later served as pastor of ECWA Seminary Church as well as chaplain of the ECWA Seminary in Jos, Nigeria. He loved being at this institution where he could influence other future leaders of the church.

Following the 1988 Jos Prayer Seminar, God called him to resign his positions and to pioneer the Nigerian Prayer Ministry where God used him to bring revival in the Evangelical Church of West Africa (ECWA) and other church denominations. He served in the Prayer ministry until he retired in 1997. Although he retired, he continued to conduct Prayer seminars until he could no longer minister due to ill health. It is reported that when the prayer seminar ministry was launched that ECWA had 2.2 million members: now it has 5.6 million with the tremendous growth being attributed to the determination that Onesimus and his staff had to lead each church to be a praying church.

Rev. O. Sule was called into glory

on Wednesday, February 19, 2014. His impact on leading every church with whom he came into contact to be a praying church will be felt by generations to come.

We are grateful for Sunday Bwanhot, Onesimus' co-worker in establishing the Nigeria Prayer Seminar Ministry, for his assistance in preparing this article. Sunday and Grace Bwanhot have served in Chicago as SIM missionaries since 1995. Through God's grace, Sunday was able to attend the memorial services conducted in Onesimus's village March 7-8. NUHU LEO is heading the Nigeria prayer ministry.

A man sent from God named Onesimus

When word came of the death of **Onesimus Sule**, my mind went back to Saturday, November 28, 1988 to a prayer seminar in Jos, Plateau State, Nigeria, the day he and I became fast friends. There he sat, regal and open, receiving the Word of God. When there was a break, he came with questions. He was not only the pastor of the ECWA Seminary Church in Jos, he was chaplain for the seminary.

As time passed, it was obvious that God was using the prayer seminars to ignite what was termed by **Dr**. **Panya Baba**, president of ECWA, as a "spiritual awakening sweeping" through Nigeria. His driver had driven all night from Port Harcourt so he could be at the Jos prayer seminar. With each report that we received at our offices in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, we rejoiced exceedingly at what God was doing. We knew that the Baptists in Imo State (Ibo language) were teaching the prayer seminar materials from the 1986 seminars conducted there. Now, we began to hear of a strong prayer movement coming from the 1988 seminar at Billiri Bible College in northeast Nigeria, an area that practiced cannibalism prior to the arrival of missionaries. An administrator there reported on the formation of a group known as "Prayer Warriors" and the construction of a Prayer Chapel Building to house the prayer movement. Prayer seminars were being taught in English and Hausa. But we never dreamed the depth of what God was doing and the impact it would have on a nation.

A letter from Onesimus Sule dated May 12, 1989, told the story. Already Onseimus had shared that the Holy Spirit had told him to resign his pastorate and his position at the seminary to "devote the rest of his life" to mobilizing prayer warriors and establishing praying churches using our prayer seminar workbook. In seeking confirmation from the leaders of ECWA, he found there was full agreement. In the letter, he shared: "I praise God for giving me opportunities to conduct prayer seminars in several towns, in Gbaloka (Benue State) April 13-15, in Keffi (Plateau State) April 24-26, and in Kaduna May 1-7. In addition eighteen Baptist white missionaries invited me to conduct a prayer seminar at Miango (Plateau State) May 17-19. We praise God for all these seminars. The Holy Spirit visited us. More invitations are mounting up; the saints have confirmed that this is the need of the hour for 'prayer is reporting to duty.' God is raising up prayer warriors in several places preparing the ground for revival in our day. Keep praying for us."

In the letter, Onesiumus shared the immediate needs to help him maintain the prayer seminar ministry in Nigeria including a vehicle for transportation, a generator to enable him to serve in villages where there was no electricity, and a typewriter. Our Doorkeepers joined in providing prayer and financial resources and all three needs were met. The result was nothing short of phenomenal. Our agreement was that whenever he felt that Sue and I needed to return that all he had to do was to let us know. Amazingly, that time did not come until five years after his retirement. During the 2002 visit, 13,000 attended the prayer seminars. We found that most of the ECWA leaders had their lives changed during the 1988 seminars at the SIM-ECWA seminaries and Bible colleges. A number brought their 1988 certificates to show us.

Onesimus not only was a leader that was well trusted, he was able to build an organization within ECWA, at their invitation, to mobilize prayer warriors, an organization that is viable and healthy in 2014. What a marvelous legacy that Onesimus Sule left throughout Nigeria, the nation with the largest population in Africa.

Satan is clearly upset by the prayer covering and has launched an all-out assault on Christians.

To state simply that each of the fourteen prayer seminars went "well" would be an understatement. The seminars went "very well!" We returned to three of South Africa's nine provinces (states): Gauteng, North West, and Northern Cape which required extensive traveling from venue to venue. We thank you for your financial and prayer support. Certainly, we can testify that prayers were answered. The team consisted of Leslie Motsalane, who has served as the JGHM Southern Africa Branch coordinator since 1998, and Albert Malloy, a long-time colleague of Leslie, and myself. Each of us had excellent health and vigor. We traveled 2,472 miles. Attendance was excellent. Sixty-one came to Christ and hundreds committed to become "Lighthouses of Prayer" for their families, their communities, their townships, their nation, and for the world. We ran out of prayer seminar workbooks with only a few for the last two prayer seminars. The \$7,650 budget was surpassed with seventy-seven contributions. [Total Miles 20,454.
