

PERSPECTIVES

For the past forty years, the theme of many issues of the **Reflector** has been Bible study and prayer—two primary disciplines in a successful Christian life. During 2018, it is my desire to again deal with these two issues. Articles in many **Reflectors** were clarion calls reminding the readers that the main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing. Attention was given to five emphases practiced by the early believers and the Jerusalem church: (1) the doctrine (the Word of God), (2) Spirit-filled [living], (3) prayer, (4) witnessing, and (5) stewardship.

In talking to Christians around the world, I have discovered that their greatest desire is to know how to pray. When a survey was conducted on "Sermons Americans Want to Hear," it was discovered that the people's first choice was "How can I make prayer effective?" Christians want to pray, but don't seem to know how. Subsequently, our spiritual lives are often at a low ebb.

Hard work. Why is it so difficult to pray? Satan does not want you to pray. In fact, he would rather you do anything than pray because prayer is the point where he is defeated. His favorite word seems to be tomorrow. He is always trying to keep us from praying today. In fact, that must be one of his main goals—to keep all Christians off their knees. He knows we already belong to God and there is nothing he can do about that. But he will do everything in his power to keep us from becoming effective, believing, praying Christians. He knows the power God has made available to us through prayer, and he does everything he can to keep it from us. He is always saying, "You can pray tomorrow. You're so busy today." And when tomorrow comes, it is the same old story, "Pray tomorrow." It's always "tomorrow" with the devil. Tomorrow—and the next day—and the one following, until we reach the end of our lives and find we have missed much that God had waiting to give to us.

The flesh (the influence of the old man who was crucified with Christ when you trusted Christ as your Savior and Lord) does not want you to pray. The flesh says that you are too tired to pray. You need to rest and relax from your heavy duties of the day. You deserve a break. And so it goes. The flesh wars against the Holy Spirit continually. Maintaining a daily, consistent prayer life is HARD WORK.

Understanding prayer. What exactly is prayer? Is it really so complicated that Christians must spend a life time searching for an answer? Or are we making something confusing out of what God intended to be beautiful in simplicity?

In basic terms, you can think of prayer as the talking part of relationship. It is a conversation between two friends who love each other—a friend talking to a friend (John 15:15). Another way is to think of prayer as a servant talking to his master (Colossians 3:24). Further, prayer can be seen as a bride talking to the bridegroom (Romans 7:4)—and that's lovers' talk full of intimacy. It is through prayer that we see God's love and power at work in our lives and in the lives of people for whom we are praying. As a result, prayer makes us come alive spiritually. Everyone knows that **verbal communication is necessary to develop healthy relationships**, so therefore, <u>when you</u> are praying you are developing your relationship with the Lord. You will never know God if you don't spend time in His presence.

Prayer is the key that opens the door to a whole new world—a world lived in active, conscious pursuit of the living God. It becomes the foundation of everything we do. We are to **order** our **lives around prayer** and **pray about everything**. <u>When we pray, we see great things happen for God; when we don't pray, we don't see much happen.</u>

The sin of prayerlessness. Many Christians acknowledge that they should pray more, but say they are simply neglecting it. God's position, however, is that prayerlessness is a sin (1 Samuel 12:23). Prayerlessness characterizes the life of many believers. It is that state in which one prays less than he ought, less than the Father desires, and less than the Father desires, and less than that one himself knows that he should. Some studies have indicated that many Christians pray less that four minutes a day, if at all.

Did you ever think of not praying as a sin? We all know we should pray and yet so few of us do. The Bible plainly says that when we know to do right and fail to do it that the failure is a sin (James 4:17). A Christian living a prayerless life is robbed of all the power God intends for him to have. So, you see prayerlessness is more than an area of neglect. It is a sin. If I don't talk to God, then it is an indication that He is really playing a secondary role in my life and a result of this, I will never be the person that <u>God wants me to b</u>e.

Prayerlessness is costly. It costs the individual who isn't praying because prayer is what God has provided to help us grow, along with the Word of God. Through the Word of God, God speaks to us: through prayer, we speak to God. Prayerlessness also costs God because this is His ordained way to get His work done. Finally, prayer costs others who do not benefit from prayers that are not prayed.

God's plan. God has chosen to limit Himself to working through us. He has made us His partners and has even entrusted the lost into our care. Apart from us, He has no body in the world—no hands and feet or heart and voice to bring His message to a dying world. God wants to save the whole world, but He will only accomplish that goal through His children. God wants to answer prayer, but He doesn't unless we pray. All God wants to do in this world through His children, including you, can only be done through prayer. This is the one, unchanging condition that must be met if we want to see God move. Everyone agrees that God is able and willing. We must add "waiting" to the list. He is waiting for us to call upon Him (Jeremiah 33:3, James 4:2b, Luke 18:1).

Why should we pray? Because God answers prayer! Do we really believe that? Do we <u>live</u> as though we believe it? If we did, I think we would be spending more time on our knees in prayer. Our time with God would be the most important thing we did all day. Unfortunately, most of us do not live that way. Year after year we pray only little prayers and get little answers.

The first step. Why do we pray so little? It isn't because we don't want to pray, because I believe most of us do. One reason is that we try to fit God in our schedule between other activities. We try to fit Him into our schedule rather than fitting our schedule around Him.

The first step on the learning-topray ladder is simple: we must make time to pray. Don't expect to awaken one morning and say, "Oh, great! I have time to pray today." It just doesn't happen that way. Our lives are so full of activities (many of them good), there just doesn't seem to be any time left over to pray. That's the first problem that must be overcome.

No one has any more time than anyone else. You and I have all the time there is. We must decide how to use our time. It boils down to deciding what is essential in your life. The reality is that we manage, always, to do the things we really want to do. We do what we think is important. A helpful exercise is to do a time study to see how we are using our time. Without fail, people who are willing to do this are surprised at how much time is spent on minor pursuits. Include attending to basic needs of grooming, eating, sleeping, working, but don't forget to include talking on the telephone, watching television, time on the computer, and such.

A study of the life of the Lord Jesus Christ during the three years of His active ministry will establish that He made prayer top priority in His life. To prioritize is to order according to importance. That is what we must do. To pray well, we must make time to pray. We must set aside a time for prayer each day. We should try to make it as regular as possible because we all work better and are more efficient when we are on some sort of schedule. Our physical bodies work best when we eat at a regular time each day and when we go to bed at a regular hour. Our spiritual lives work best when we have a regular time to be alone with God each day, reading His Word and praying.

The ideal time is the early morning. A principle is simply to start your day with God. <u>Don't wait until you</u> have messed up your day and then bring the pieces to God to put back together. Jesus Himself followed early morning praying arising long before day for prayer (Mark 1:35). His teachings in the **Model Prayer** include praying for daily bread and to not be led into temptation. In His day, folks did not have refrigeration. Rather, the custom was to go to the market and get enough food for the day. When a person waits until night to pray, he could have gone hungry all day. Temptation does not come when we go to bed to sleep. Temptation comes when we are in the world. Look through your daily schedule and find the best time for you to pray. Then make an appointment to meet God; keep the appointment.

Being with Him. Remember this: Our highest calling in life, when all is said and done, is not in serving Jesus, but in being with Him. Our <u>effective</u> service and love for others can only come from being alone with God in prayer and in fellowship and in the reading of His Word. Isn't this what Jesus told Martha in Luke 18:38-42? Martha was busy rushing around the kitchen, trying to get things ready. Mary was simply sitting at the feet of Jesus. Martha couldn't understand this and went into the living room to complain. "Do you think it is fair for Mary to be sitting there with You when there is so much work to be done?" And Jesus said to her gently, "Martha, Martha—there is really only one thing worth being concerned about, and Mary has discovered it." Have you learned, as Mary did, what is really of lasting value in your life?

No matter how busy and full your day may be, the most worthwhile thing you can do is to "sit" alone at the feet of Jesus. Sitting means taking time to be relaxed. Prepare your mind. Think. This is the most important part of your day. Don't rush. Determine to "wait upon the Lord" (Isaiah 40:31), to "be still and know He is God" (Psalm 46:10-11), to take the initiative to "draw nigh to God" knowing that when you do He will "draw nigh to you" (James 4:8).

Spiritual discipline. We have become a generation of soft, weak, undisciplined, prayerless Christians. Spiritual discipline is the key to growth in the spiritual life. It is the only key that will open the door to a full and joyous life with Christ. Why are there so many weak, frail, stumbling Christians today? Because we have ignored the only Source of our strength and power—the Lord Jesus Christ—and the importance of being with Him, loving Him, and sharing our lives with Him in prayer. God being our Helper, we want to do something about this matter.

Future studies. It would be unfair for me to urge you to set aside time for daily prayer, without sharing some practical things you can do to make it so. For many years, I preached the Word of God telling people what to do, never sharing how they could do it. I simply sent them away on a guilt trip. Now I know better. In the next few issues, I am going to follow an outline developed by Matthew Henry in a series of lectures delivered in the year 1712. In May, the theme will be "How to Begin the Day with God;" in June, "How to Spend the Day with God;" and in July, "How to Close the Day with God." My prayer is that the 2018 perspectives will make a tremendous difference to many people.

I ONE PERSON CAN BE A LIGHTHOUSE OF PRAYER

DAILY INTERCESSION

What is intercessory prayer? Prayer is coming to the Father through the Son in the power of the Holy Spirit on behalf of others. The fundamental principle is focusing the power of God on a person or a situation. Notice a believer is not alone when he prays. The moment a Christian begins to pray, both Jesus and the Holy Spirit join that person (Romans 8:26-27) as Helpers (the word is Paracletos, One called along side to help). The Son is seated in the Throne Room of Heaven at the right hand of His Father and the Holy Spirit lives within the believer.

Over the years, we have received many prayer requests. My own practice is to pray for the request right then holding the person's hand when possible. God often answers immediately but other times later. Many prayer requests are of such nature that they require daily intercession. Sue joins me and we pray in agreement.

The "Daily Intercession" page is reserved for <u>pressing</u> needs. Most relate to health issues. For God's glory, we ask for healing (**James 5:14**). You never have to bear your burden alone.

Another feature of the page is the list of a few representative missonaries/ nationals to remind us to pray for them and their work.

Many of you have prayed with us for his healing on earth. We know that God could have cleared up the mass in his abdomen when the Vanderbilt doctors said that they could not, but this was not His will. His will was for this man of God to come into His presence. Seeing the faith

of Stan and Emily certainly blessed my soul many times during his long illness. Now we pray for Emily and their wonderful family. The obituary excerpts that follow illustrate the powerful impact of this godly couple:

Because Stanley Mack Baskin (65) believed in and professed Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior, on February 27th, he passed from death into eternal life. He is no longer seeing dimly but face to face in the presence of his Savior. Stan had one goal in life - to know God and make Him known. He did this in his home, his church, and his community. Shortly before his retirement, he became a licensed real estate agent. ...

Faith will not purchase for the Christian immunity from the sorrows and tragedies of life. It will, however, empower him to triumph in them. Scripture and experience teach that tragedy [trouble] strikes in the lives of just and unjust alike. There is no respect of persons. How else do we explain the tragedy of the cross? Here was the ultimate in tragedy, yet it was utterly powerless to shake the faith of **the Son of God** in His Father's love. In the darkness of Golgotha two momentous utterances affirmed His unwavering trust. "My God, my God, why didst Thou forsake Me?" and "Father, into Thy hands I commend My spirit." Even in the hour of deepest suffering He claimed God as His Father. Knowledge had begotten trust.

In the dawn of human history, the most upright man of his day was beset by tragedy upon tragedy. **Job** was denuded of flocks and herds, sons and daughters, servants and wealth. He lost his health and even the supporting confidence of his wife. And his reaction? "Though He slay me yet will I trust in Him" (**Job 13:15**).

Stationed on his watchtower, the prophet **Habakkuk** was perplexed by unanswered prayer and an apparently inactive Providence. The affliction of the righteous and the prosperity of the evil-doer confused him until he receive a word from the Lord. "The righteous shall live by his faith"(2:4). With this assurance, he met stark tragedy no blossoms on the fig tree, no fruit on the vine; barren olive trees and parched fields; folds without flocks and stalls without herds. The whole economy of the nation foundered. And the answer of faith? Ÿet I will I rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation (3:17-18). Since he had God, he had all and could survive tragedy and heartbreak.
