

## "God sent His Son, they called Him Jesus"

**THE MEANING OF CHRISTMAS** is encapsulated in familiar words written by **Bill & Gloria Gaither** in *Because He Lives*: "God sent His Son, they called Him Jesus." The Father has only one Son and He allowed Him to leave His home in Heaven and come to earth as the key element in His redemptive plan for mankind..

The story of Jesus never grows old and we who know it best cry out with **Fanny Crosby**: "Tell me the story of Jesus, write on my heart every word." Once we know the story we need to ponder every aspect in our hearts as did **Mary**, the mother of Jesus, as she considered what she was experiencing with her firstborn Son (**Luke 2:19**).

John, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, wrote "the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). This is the incarnation — God in human form.

There are lessons to learn from the simple narratives recorded in the Gospels of the events surrounding the coming of the Messiah. But the lessons must not end with His birth and focus on the baby Jesus.

## "He came to love, heal and forgive; He lived and died to buy my pardon."

Lessons begin when the young woman, Mary, a virgin, conceived and then birthed a Son. Details are recorded in the written Word of God as the Holy Spirit continued His work inspiring the Gospel writers to write the inspiring words. Without this **revelation**, we would have no clue as to what happened and its meaning.

Consider the awe of **Mary** as she learned what was going to transpire as she would be a mother, and the months of waiting that followed. With a submissive spirit, Mary said: "Behold the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to Your word" (Luke 1:38). Even though she did not understand, her heart sang the beautiful Magnificat: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit has rejoiced in God my Savior. For He has regarded the lowly state of His maidservant; For behold, henceforth, all generations will call me blessed. For He who is mighty has done great things for me, and holy is His name" (vv 46-49).

Consider the thoughts of **Joseph**, a just man, who learned that the woman he had chosen to be his wife was with child. He was troubled and did not want to embarrass the one he had chosen to be his wife (**Matthew 1:19**)..

Consider how God controlled the events of history to place this couple in **Bethlehem**, where it had been established that the Messiah would be born. A decree came from Caesar Augustus that everyone had to register in their original city to be taxed. Joseph came from the city of David, called **Bethlehem**, where it had been foretold some eight hundred years earlier would be the birthplace of the Messiah (**Micah 5:2, Luke 2:1**).

Consider the challenge of a long journey from Nazareth in Galilee to Bethlehem in Judea (Luke 2:4-5). Consider that there was no room in the inn. Consider the provision of a stable (possibly a hillside cave). "And she brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room in the inn" (v 7). Consider His birth and the reception that was given in the heavens, as angels celebrated, and on earth, as shepherds hastened to see the new baby. Feel their hearts beat with joy and listen to their voices "glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told them" (vv 8-20).

There is the story of the Star in the East that led the wise men from their homes in the East to visit the young child. When they arrived, they "fell down and worshiped Him" and brought Him gifts worthy of a king (Matthew 2:11).

Tell me the story of Jesus — every word. But there is more than a birth account. He lived on earth for thirty-three years. In the early years, He grew in favor with God and man spiritually, physically, mentally, and socially (Luke 2:52).. For three years, He had a ministry. During the first thirty years, known as the "silent years," we ponder the account of His visit to the temple in Jerusalem when he was twelve astonishing the leaders with His words. He returned home "subject to his parents" (v 51).

Whne He was thirty, Jesus began His ministry appearing at the River Jordan to be baptized by John the Baptist.

#### "He came to love, heal and forgive"

Jesus' words and His works are thrilling to behold as He touched lives calling disciples, teaching them, and preparing them to carry on His work after He returned to His Father in Heaven. The Spirit of the Lord was upon Him with anointing to preach good tidings to the poor. He healed the brokenhearted and proclaimed liberty to the captives. He opened the prison of those who were bound and proclaimed the acceptable year of the Lord just as the prophet predicted in **Isaiah** 61:1-2. He was the Lord, the Messiah, the Anointed One. He went about teaching in the synagogues, preaching good news, and healing those who came. His words were spoken with authority. Those who heard His gracious words reported that "no man speaks as this Man" (John 7:46). From Heaven, the Father observed the obedience of His Son in all things and spoke "This is My Son and I am pleased with Him" Matthew 3:17).

**"TELL ME THE STORY OF JESUS, WRITE ON MY HEART EVERY WORD.** Fasting alone in the desert, Tell of the days that are past, How for our sins He was tempted, Yet was triumphant at last. Tell of the years of His labor, Tell of the sorrow He bore, He was despised and afflicted, Homeless, rejected, and poor."

#### "He lived and died to buy my pardon"

Watching the opposition begin and build to the point until some wanted to kill Him causes us sadness. John, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, wrote "He came to His own and His own received Him not" (John 1:12). We see Him going to the cross. "Up Calvary's mountain, one dreadful morn, Walked Christ my Savior, weary and worn; Facing for sinners death on the cross, That He might save them from endless loss" (Avis Christiansen-1922) We join those who loved Him standing at the foot of the cross and weep with broken hearts. We hear Him say, "Father, forgive them!" (Luke 23:34)... "Even while His life-blood flowed fast away; Praying for sinners while in such woe No one but Jesus ever loved so." He died holding in His body nail-pierced hands and feet. Loving hands prepared His body and laid it in a borrowed tomb. "For [the Father] made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him" (2 Corinthians 5:21). A young lad exegeted this verse simply: "He traded places with us." So He did "TELL ME THE STORY OF JESUS, WRITE ON MY HEART EVERY WORD. Tell of the cross where they nailed Him, Writhing in anguish and pain; Tell of the grave where they laid Him, Tell how He liveth again."

#### "An empty grave is there to prove my Savior lives"

Wonder of wonders! My Savior lives. On the third day, the tomb in which Jesus' body was laid was empty. He lives! "Because He lives, I can face tomorrow; because He lives all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living just because He lives." Not only do we celebrate His birth, we celebrate His life, His death, His burial, and His resurrection knowing because He lives, we will live also. All fear is gone. **TELL ME THE STORY OF JESUS, WRITE ON MY HEART EVERY WORD.** Love in that story so tender, Clearer than ever I see; Stay, let me weep while you whisper, Love paid the ransom for me."

## MAKE ROOM FOR JESUS

No room for Jesus? No room for the King of kings? That was the reality on that longago night in Bethlehem over 2,000 years ago.. There was no room for Jesus in the world that He had made imagine! But what about today? Have you any room for Jesus? This is the issue.

Things have not really changed. Jesus came to manifest the Father. He wanted the world to know about God But God is still on the fringes most of the days of our lives. We fit Him in when it is convenient for us, but we become irritated when He makes demands of us. Our lives are so full. Even during the time when we celebrate His coming into the world, we are in danger of excluding Him from our hearts and lives. Think this through in your life and say with gusto and meaning: "Oh, come to my heart, Lord Jesus; there is room in my heart for You." This will make Christmas more meaningful and will prepare you for a new beginning making room for Jesus

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# Be ready for 2010



In a few days, we will say GOODBYE to 2009 and HELLO to 2010. Will you be ready for spiritual growth? In many ways, that will be up to you. Unless you plan to grow and then take the steps to implement your plan, growth will not happen. One of the most important decisions in my lifetime (in 1976) was to get into the Word of God for my food, not just to find a message to preach.

What a privilege for us to have a relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ the eternal Son of God. The relationship, however, must be on His terms and not ours. Some profess this relationship but know little of what Christ taught, less of what He promised, and less of what He requires.

The Bible is the place where we get information on what to do after we begin the Christian life. If you have not been studying the Bible, may I make a suggestion? In the **Reflector's Prayer Calendar**, I include a through-the-Bible reading plan. Join me on January 1 and read the Bible through in 2010. If you stick with it, you will be both enriched and challenged by its message. You will be motivated to be a more mature, spiritual Christian. Remember the Bible is the window through which we see eternity and what is ahead.

Approach your Bible reading with reverent anticipation that God will speak as you read. Ask the Holy Spirit, the One who inspired the writing of the Word, to **illuminate** your mind as you read. It is then you will understand and begin to see things from God's point of view. Act on the Word once you understand it. Then, you will be equipped for the tasks God gives you in your daily circumstances.

A key passage is 1 Timothy 3:15-17. Note the "how" of the equipping in Verse 15: through teaching (tells you what to do); reproof (tells you what not to do) and through correction (tells you what to do when you have done what you were told not to do). Note that this covers about everything! So, plan to join us in a journey of spiritual growth in 2010.

## Cultivative evangelism

If a farmer expects good results from scattering his seed, he will be careful to prepare the soil. He will do everything he possibly can to make the soil receptive to the good seed he will plant. If we expect good results from our witnessing, then we need to prepare the soil to help make it receptive to God's Word. How? Paul tells us a practical way to open them to the Gospel: "So, then, while we have opportunity, let us do good to all men " (Galatians 6:10). Definite expressions of love actions, not just words will open the way for the Gospel. It's not enough just to talk and expect to be heard. We must earn the right to be heard.

There is no better time than the Christmas season to plan expressions of love using as many means as possible. As you plan your contact, it is important to pray for the person. If you have not assimilated 1 John 5:14-15 in your mind and spirit, this would be a good time to do so. Particularly, list the key words. "Pray," "will of God," "confidence," "God hears you," and "will do what you ask." The passage is as follows: "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us, and if we know that He hears us, whatever we ask, we know that we have the petitions we ask of Him." What a wonderful promise to claim. Once you believe God's promise revealed in this passage, you are ready to begin praying for the unsaved person by name. There are five thoughts that will guide you as you pray for the lost individual you are seeking to reach. Pray for the person by name. Remember intercession is praying that focuses the power of God on a person or a circumstance.

1. Will of God. Without doubt, it is the will of God that the person be saved. One need only read 2 Peter 3:9 and 1 John 2:3-4 to

know that this is true. The blood of Jesus has been shed for each person.

2. Ask God to bind Satan. I firmly believe that there is one specific prayer that is needed. It is to ask God, in the name of Jesus, to bind Satan. You see the Word of God teaches that Satan has blinded the mind of the person who is lost (2 Corinthians 4:4). You might as well invite a glass of water to trust Christ as an unsaved person whose mind is blind. He does not understand your invitation to trust Christ.

3. **Pray** the person will come under **conviction** and develop an awareness that he needs to be saved. This, of course, will be the work of the Holy Spirit whose assignment is to "convict the world of sin, righteousness, and judgment to come" (John 16:8-11).

4. **Pray for a laborer** to share the simple Gospel that includes a decision to trust Christ as Savior. Jesus knew that it is important to His program to have individuals who work in His vineyard and instructed His disciples to pray for laborers (**Matthew 9:35-38**, **Luke 10:2**, **John 4:35**). The fields are white ready to harvest now, not four months from now. There are many believers who can explain the way to come to Christ. Pray that one who can do this will come along side. You might be that person. Remember that "faith" does not save a person; rather, it gets him/her to Christ. Basically the word means "trust" through an act of the will.

5. Pray that the decision will be made now because tomorrow might be too late (2 Corinthians 6:2).

Without doubt, the most valuable gift that any unsaved person could receive this Christmas is a Savior. That is exactly what God provided in giving His Son. Ask the Holy Spirit to guide you in your selection of individuals who can be reached through personal, cultivative evangelism. Then prepare yourself to begin this outreach.

# An explanation


Sometimes someone asks me to explain my strong interest in prayer and other elements of the Spirit-filled life. In 1976, my work as pastor of **Pleasant View Baptist Church** and Vice President for Academic Affairs at **Liberty Baptist College** (Liberty University) kept me busy. Both the church and the college were doing well. Attendance at the church was increasing and souls were being saved. The church was growing and involved in a building program. As is true in any new college, there were myriad duties that demanded my time and attention developing programs, policies and procedure, hiring faculty, serving the students.

The time came for our daughter, Mona, who served as organist at Pleasant View, to go away to Converse College (SC). I asked Richard and Ruth Elmer to come help us. Richard, the Director of Library Services at Liberty, was an outstanding soloist and she was an accomplished organist. As they settled into their ministry at PVBC, they discerned that my understanding of the Holy Spirit and His work was minimal. Instead of talking with me about this, they made it a matter of prayer. Soon I became conscious of the Holy Spirit and began to prepare messages related to the Holy Spirit. Since I preached from extensive notes and recorded the date for each message, I can trace my pilgrimage. Once I realized that "Spirit-filled" did not mean "more" of the Holy Spirit, but "controlled" by the Holy Spirit, my perspective changed. My desire was to allow Him to control my life in the sense of what I later understood as the 'deeper Christian life" movement.

About the same time, **Armin Gesswein's** booklet, **The Seven Wonders of Prayer**, crossed my desk. It was through his writings that I came to understand that prayer is not bringing God down to earth; rather, prayer is going into His presence in the Throne Room. I became consumed with the subject of prayer. I began to realize that few Christians are prayed for regularly once they become saved and that prayer is the work that must come before all other work in the Church. This led to a 24/7 prayer ministry with someone praying in the Prayer Chapel every hour around the clock. To prepare the prayer warriors, I wrote lessons week by week and taught them on Sunday nights.

My interest continued when I became president of Northeastern Bible College, across the river from New York City. The first "prayer seminar" was conducted at Madison Baptist Church, Madison, New Jersey, in September 1980. The subject of prayer consumed me to the point that I perceived the greatest contribution that I could make to the cause of Christ was to teach people the purpose and power of prayer. During the week days, I was at my desk at Northeastern, but most weekends I was somewhere conducting a prayer seminar. When I accepted the position of Executive Director for the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), it was with the understanding that the prayer seminar ministry would be my priority. It is my judgment that the successes that came for TRACS and the mountain of work that was done to gain recognition from the U. S. Department of Education were special blessings based on keeping the prayer ministry strong and central.

The Doorkeeper Program was born in the early morning hours on July 17, 1980 as I read 1 Chronicles 9:22(LB): "There were 212 Doorkeepers in those days ... chosen on the basis of their genealogies ... and appointed because of their reliability." Doorkeepers, through their prayer and financial support, have enabled me to have this ministry. To represent the Doorkeeper **Program**, we use a door design from Colonial America that is still commonly used today. The top panel uses the symbol of the Cross and the bottom panel is an open Bible. This door is a reminder of Christ, the Living Word, and the Bible, the written Word.
