

PERSPECTIVE A FINAL WORD

"It is better to trust in the LORD than to put confidence in man." Psalm 118:8



The shortest chapter in the Bible is **Psalm 117** (two verses), the longest **Psalm 119** (one-hundred seventy-six verses). The short psalm is about a big subject: helping all the nations to praise the Lord God of Israel whose mercy is great and truth enduring. What He does is merciful and what He says is dependable. The theme of the long psalm is the Word of God. Every verse except five (84,

80, 121, 122, 132) refers to God's Word -- what it is and what it will do in lives. Most of the verses are either prayers for God's help or affirmations of the writer's faith in God's truth despite the difficulties and obstacles he was facing. Meditating on this psalm ought to make a believer love and treasure the Word of God more and obey it willingly.

Nestled between the shortest and longest chapters is the middle verse in the Bible which states that "It is better to trust in the LORD than to put confidence in man" (Psalm 118:8). The New International Version is that "It is better to take refuge in the Lord than to trust in man."

It seems to me that the key words are trust, confidence, and refuge in the light of the object and direction of each. The centrality of the verse in the Bible accents the truth as another one of those anchors of the soul. Trust God to guide and provide. Beware of placing confidence in human power because one day it will fade no matter how strong it appears at the moment. This is a good reminder, isn't it?

As one grows older in the Lord, he experiences the mercies of God which are new every morning (Lamentations 3:22-23) as God's faithfulness is demonstrated. As answers to his prayers mount, the believer becomes stronger in faith, no longer fearful when trials and adversaries come. After seeing God often turn defeat into victory and darkness into light, he is increasingly confident that "the Lord is round about His people from henceforth even forever" (Psalm 125:2). He can affirm with strong assurance and confidence that "we know that all things work together for good to them that love God who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).

God works in "all things" -- not just isolated instances -- for our good. This does not mean that all that happens to us is good. Christians are not immune from the evil which pervades our fallen world. But God is able to turn every circumstance around for our long-range good. Note that God is not working to make us comfortable or happy; He is working to fulfill His purpose in the lives of those "called" by the Holy Spirit who convicts and enables them to receive the Lord Jesus Christ.

Such people have a new perspective, a new mind-set and worldview. They trust in God, not life's treasures; they look for their security in Heaven, not on earth. Although there are friends and loved ones who care, human strength and wisdom is not enough. We should again say it: beware of placing confidence in human power because one day it will fade no matter how strong it appears now.

A young lad was sitting calmly in his seat in a plane that had run into turbulence that had all the grown-ups frightened and concerned -- far beyond what even the seasoned travelers had experienced. Some were praying who had not prayed for a long time. Finally someone asked the boy why he was not afraid. He said quickly and confidently, "The pilot is my dad. He will bring us safely through."

It is a mistake to trust anyone or anything more than God! Why? Because we are all human and do not have the power needed. He does! Let's take refuge in Him, trust Him, and have confidence in Him. He cares! He has demonstrated His love to us that when we were yet sinners, He gave His Son to die for us. There is no greater love.

For twenty-seven years of my life, I was bi-vocational, an educator and a local church pastor. Both roles were very important to me. There was never any conflict between the two

When the invitation came to set aside the pastorate and assume the presidency of Northeastern Bible College, I was somewhat conflicted. For over 1,400 Sundays I was in the pulpit for a morning and evening sermon. Beginning at seventeen, one of my hats was a pastor's hat. What would my life be if I were not a pastor?

Sue and I prayed about the invitation. She decided to drive down into North Carolina to spend time in prayer. God's answer was "Who knows whether you have come into the kingdom for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14b). So off to New Jersey we trekked.

There were numerous invitations to preach all around the Northeast. When the late Howard Kauffmann (1923-2016) was named the honorary chair of the National Bible Society, he chaired a luncheon at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City along with our pastor, Jim Hooton, and his wife. We discussed my interest in prayer and a 24/7 prayer ministry established in Virginia. I shared my writing the weekly studies which I taught during the Training Union hour, one hour preceding the Sunday evening worship, to prepare the 168 prayer warriors. The mimeograph stencils were accessible, ready to duplicate. Each person at the table expressed interest. None of us imagined that out of the Madison Baptist Church Prayer Conference would come a worldwide prayer seminar ministry that remains strong and vibrant under the leadership of Adam Nathanson and his team. In reviewing the steps that brought Sue and me to this seminal moment, we can see God's hand in opening doors and providing every need every step of the way. What can we say but "WHAT A MIGHTY GOD WE SERVE!"
