

## God's Prayer Book

The Bible is a ready-made prayer book for God's family. In fact, many passages are recorded prayers. Dr. Herbert Lockyer (1886-1984) spent nearly three decades as a pastor in England and Scotland before coming to the United States where he conducted a ten-year lecturing ministry under the auspices of Moody Bible Institute. He authored more than fifty books including the well-known, fifteen volume "All" series that includes All the Prayers in the Bible (one of my favorites). He and Dr. Robert Witty (1906-2007), founder of Luther Rice Seminary who co-authored The Enabler with me) were best friends. Dr. Lockyer maintained there are over 700 prayers recorded in the Bible; 350 have answers.

Session two of the Prayer Seminar Workbook (copies available through JGHM) is entitled "Bible Examples of Prayer" and features Jabez as the Old Testament example (2 Chronicles 4:9-10) and Jesus as the New Testament example (twenty-one times we see Him praying and another twenty-one times He is teaching about prayer). Did Jesus believe in prayer? Yes. How do we know? We have His example.

For more than three thousands years, believers have used the **Psalms** as a prayer book for private and public worship. And at the heart of the book is the 119<sup>th</sup> Psalm—176 verses of "praying Scripture!" We "pray the Scripture" when we use passages of Scripture to form prayers or when we say the verses directly back to God, making them our own expressions. Jesus said, "If you remain in Me and My words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be given you" (**John 15:7**).

Moses used God's own words to intercede for his stubborn mob of desert wanderers. Jesus often used Scriptures in His prayer for Himself and His disciples. In

fact, throughout the Bible we see examples of godly men and women incorporating God's promises and commands in their petitions to Him. They used the Word in their prayers for encouragement, calling to mind who God is and what He has done. Jesus and His disciples sang the psalms together as part of morning and evening prayers. And at the moment of His greatest agony on the cross, Jesus cried out the words of a psalm: "My God, my God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Psalm 22:1).

I recall quite vividly the deep desire the Holy Spirit planted in me in 1977 and thereafter to learn everything I could about prayer. My library grew as I added book after book (now in the Northeastern Baptist College Library in Bennington, Vermont). I began to incorporate prayer as a major element in my life, in my teaching/living/and in my pastorate. I listened to tapes or attended lectures of spiritual giants, many who became my friends over the years (Jack Mccalaster, Peter Lord, Huber Drumwright, Dwight Pentecost, Ron Dunn, Jack Taylor and others). I used what I learned to write lessons that became the **Prayer** Seminar Workbook. The Prayer Seminar, a six-hour event, came into existence. My passion became a prayer seminar ministry that absorbed my life. The first seminar, outside my own pastorate, was in September 1980 at Madison Baptist Church, Madison, New Jersey.

God began to open doors with invitations coming from far and near from churches, groups, ministries, colleges/seminaries, annual retreats/conventions.

Seminars have been conducted in most evangelical denominations and with many non-denominational groups. There have been more than 2,000 prayer seminars in forty-seven states, the District of Columbia, and over sixty nations on six continents. Some nations have been blanketed by prayer seminars including Nigeria, South Africa, Kenya, Peru, Venezuela, Cuba, and South Korea (to name a few).

Since my weekdays were devoted to serving as president for Northeastern Bible College or Executive Director for the Transnational Association for Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), most prayer seminars were on Sunday (six hours = "A Day in God's Courts.") We have hundreds of testimonies as to the effectiveness of an all-day seminar.

In speaking of a Sunday seminar, one **New Jersey pastor** commented: "Our people greatly appreciated the seminar. It was truly a good experience just being together "in the Word" for that length of time. I can see where the all-day seminar is more profitable to the Body than a weeklong series of meetings. We plan to do this again." An **Alabama pastor** (who later served one of Maryland's leading Baptist churches and then led the SBC Ocala Baptist Association in Florida) wrote: "I am unable to express the joy and deep appreciation for the prayer seminar. I do not believe I have ever attended any seminar, or training conference of any type, that was more helpful than the prayer seminar. I am confident that I speak for our members as well."

Finally, a highly respected Tennessee

pastor shared: "On behalf of all of us here at Park Avenue, Nashville, thank you for the blessings of this past Sunday. I believe it will go down as one of the great days in the history of our church, as far as spiritual growth is concerned."

International feedback has been on the same level of impact. One dramatic illustration was when secular newspapers in Nigeria carried headlines of a series of prayer seminars in seminaries and Bible colleges (Sudan Interior Mission and Evangelical Church of West Africa), SPIRITUAL AWAKENING SWEEPS NIGERIA. Literally thousands have come to Christ through this ministry. In a few short years, ECWA's membership grew from 2.2 million to over five million. Prayer is the work that must come before all other work.

Ways to Pray the Bible. If you've written someone's name next to a Bible verse as many of you have done, then you have begun to pray the Bible. You're saying to God, "This is my heart's desire for this person. I agree with the truth and promise of Your words here, and I claim them for this person." Here are six other ways to pray Scripture.

1 PERSONALIZING A BIBLE PRAYER. Our Father in heaven, Thank You that Jesus showed us and taught us how to talk to You. Hallowed be Your name. We come before You with respect and love today.

2 PERSONALIZING A BIBLE TEACHING. Thank You, Father, for never being too busy or making us wait while You listen to someone else. Thank You for listening to us when

we're happy, grateful, sad, angry, or in any kind of trouble. Your Word says, "Call upon me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you will honor Me (Psalm 50:15).

3 PRAYING THROUGH A BIBLE PASSAGE. Dear Great Shepherd, yes, You are our Shepherd. Because of this, we know we'll never be without anything we truly need (Psalm 23:1). 4 PERSONALIZING A BIBLE PROMISE. Help us to keep asking for big, big things because You can do more than we ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20). We know that even now a miracle might be knocking on our door. You, Father, can do more than we ask or even imagine;

5 PERSONALIZING A BIBLE STORY. [Zacchaeus encounters Jesus] Thank You, Lord Jesus, that You are willing to go out of Your way to look for people who are looking for You (Luke 19:5).

6 PERSONALIZING A BIBLE TRUTH AS MEDITATION. I am welcome in my Father's presence today—no matter what (Hebrews 10:19-22).

During your daily Quiet Time, it will be well to begin by asking God to speak to you from His Word. Read your Bible first before you get into serious prayer time. The Word is His voice. Listen with the intention to put into your life and practice anything that the Holy Spirit tells you to do. Obedience is the bottom line of Christianity.


### A Favorite Acronym

Sue Henry has always favored acronyms, handy memory devices. So do I. Even teaching graduate students a course in human development, I used the first session each semester to explain teaching-learning and included some remarks about helpful memory techniques. Knowing the required reading for the course (sometimes a chapter before the next session OR an entire book), I taught them the P-Q-R-S-T study approach. P is preview, basically getting your brain in gear. Turn through the pages. Look at chapter/paragraph headings, words that are bold, italicized, or underlined. Look at illustrations and read their captions. By all means, if there is a chapter summary, read it carefully. Q is questions. If any of the above stir interest, ask questions that might be answered as you read. Only when your brain is in gear are you ready for serious reading and studying. R is read the text. S is a key component. While you are reading, look away from the page or close your eyes and state to yourself some things you have just read. T is test yourself later in the day (or even at night when the light is extinguished) to see what you remember from your reading. Isn't the P-Q-R-S-T technique helpful? You can apply it to your Bible reading as well.

Ι have A-C-T-S to teach the elements of prayer: Adoration, Confession, <u>T</u>hanksgiving, <u>S</u>eeking for self (petition) and for others (intercession). Anytime something strengthens memory, intentionally

put it into practice.

One of Sue's favorite acronyms is G-R-A-C-E.



Recently, our daughter, Mona Thomas, shared a thought-provoking acronym for B-I-B-L-E.

> Basic **Instructions** Before Leaving Earth

YES, THE BIBLE IS THE ONLY RELIABLE SOURCE OF THE INSTRUCTIONS YOU AND WILL NEED TO PREPARE FOR LEAVING THE EARTH. The Bible has the answers. One of my favorite authors is G. Campbell Morgan (1863-1945). His legacy includes about sixty of the most beloved books for understanding and preaching from Scripture. He said of the Bible-anchored truths: On every page of the God-breathed writings there are many thoughts, which stretch out like long, clear arms of light across the darkness, discovering things which otherwise were hidden, and illumination wider areas than those of the immediate context.

ARE YOU GROWING IN THE LORD?

### DR. HERBERT FERGUS THOMSON, Jr. (1917-2013)

During my time at Berea College, Kentucky (1953-57), a school where no one loafs and all work, one of my labor assignments was to be the student grader for Dr. Herbert F. Thomson, Jr. His grandparents and parents were Presbyterian missionaries in China. He graduated from the Shanghai American School. He was later graduated from Princeton University, Princeton Seminary, Columbia University, and the University of Colorado at Boulder.

Dr. Thomson called me Jimmy and became my mentor. I not only respected him as a great theologian and professor, I loved him as a personal friend and counted it a great honor to be his student assistant. But I could do somethina that he could not do. I could drive a car; he could not. So ... I taught him to drive. From that time, he would drive up into the mountains of eastern Kentucky and speak at small Presbyterian churches while I was tending my flock at the Liberty Avenue Baptist Church in Berea. Some nights, as my schedule allowed, I traveled with him.

One night on our drive back to Berea, Dr. Thomson said that one of the main responsibilities of a true spokesman for God was to comfort the afflicted and afflict the comforted, Since I was engaged in my boot camp preparing for future ministry, I began to understand that viewpoint and incorporate this as one of the guidelines for pastoral ministry.

Dr. Thomson taught at the Gerard

Institute in Sidon, Lebanon. He also taught at Dickinson College, Pennsylvania, and was a faculty member at Muskingum College (John Glenn's alma mater) from 1961 to 1992. At the invitation of Rea Martin (one of our first Doorkeepers), my classmate at Berea and then pastor of First Baptist Church, Cambridge, Ohio, I conducted an Guernsey County area wide prayer seminar, A Day in God's Courts. Dr. Thomson attended and urged me to go to dinner with him. He needed to talk with me about a trend that he saw developing, pastors divorcing their wives, remarrying, and continuing their pastorates. In fact, this had happened in Cambridge. I'm really bothered. This is not right, is it? My answer was swift and unequivocal. No. What a travesty for any church or city to see such a spectacle! I would add, DISGRACEFUL.

On July 24, 2013, at the age of ninety-six, Dr. Thomson experienced another graduation—to his home in Heaven. He was buried in Dillsburg, Pennsylvania.

I cherish a book my professor and mentor gave me at my Berea College graduation in 1957, The Book of Common Worship. I want to share the card that has rested inside that book for the past sixty-three years. The thought expresses my deepest thoughts toward family, friends, and, especially teachers who invested in my life, none more significant than Dr. Thomson. To these teachers. I am a debtor--forever grateful for their influence in shaping my life and my ministry.

#### Consecration

Use me, My Savior, for whatever purpose and in whatever way You may require. Here is my poor heart, an empty vessel; fill it with Your grace. Here is my sinful and troubled soul; quicken it and re-freshen it with Your love. Take my heart for Your abode; my mouth to spread abroad the glory of Your name; my love and all my powers for the advance of Your believing people and never allow the steadfastness and confidence on my faith to abate.

### Dio volente ("d.v.")

"whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow, For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time, and then vanishes away"

(James 4:14),

These are the words of James. the half-brother of Jesus and a leader in the early church in Jerusalem, in what is probably the very first epistle written. Another translation expresses it thusly, You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes (NIV). This phrase is in a paragraph that deals with making plans (James 4:13-17). James says, Come now, you who say 'Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a city, spend a year there, buy and sell, and make a profit; whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little while, and then vanishes away. Instead you ought to say, If the Lord wills, we shall live and do this or that. The problem here is not the plan or the concept of planning; it is leaving God out of the plan. An elderly school teacher always closed her letters to ex-students with Finally one student ventured to ask her what the

initials meant. The answer was **Dio volente**—if God wills.

Those of you who have followed our ministry know that the JGHM Board of Directors approved a Five-Year Plan to position us for the future with the desire that the prayer seminar ministry would continue in the future. Although we did not complete each of the goals that were set, a major one was achieved and implemented. Adam Nathanson has resumed responsibility for The Prayer Seminar. During 2020, he and his team have taught a number of prayer seminars operating under the parameters set for COVID-19 events Adam has conducted seminars and other ministry in a number of states.

The primary focus of 2021 is The <u>Prayer Seminar</u> in the light of it continuing on and on. Attention will be given to anchoring and strengthening Adam's work as leader of The Prayer Seminar. Dio volente (if God wills) Dr. Henry (85) and Sue (82) will remain active through 2021. Plans are to prepare twelve Reflectors for its 67th year of publication, produce a new DVD of the six-hour prayer seminar following the thirtypage Prayer Seminar Workbook, supervise the other print ministry, including the eight books that he has written to flesh out points taught in the prayer seminar (A Christian's

Many inquiries come from time to time wanting to know if there is a DVD Prayer Seminar with Dr Henry teaching that can be used individually, in small groups, and/or in churches, The JGHM MUSEUM will be a focus of the last year for the Henrys.

Since the late 1990s, JGHM website [jgordonhenryministries. org] has been available. The late Lon Thomas developed and maintained the website until his death. Although there are helpful features on the site, it must be updated. Currently Reflectors since 2006 are archived on the site. Fifteen favorite sermons Dr Henry has preached during his twenty-seven years as a pastor/evangelist are also available. If God wills to extend His grace and blessings, we can make decided progress in many areas.

### Holding the Ropes

When the risen Christ last appeared to His disciples before ascending to His Father to sit at

His right hand in the Throne Room of Heaven, the position of honor and authority where He is now making intercession for us, He gave them a task that encompasses the world. They were assigned the mission be His witnesses to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8). In essence, He cautioned, But don't even think about it until the Holy Spirit comes to empower you.

The disciples obeyed. They put aside their curiosity about when God would restore the kingdom to Israel. Instead, they gave themselves to prayer. The Spirit came on the Day of Pentecost (fifty days after the Passover) and in the Spirit's power they bore witness to the crucified-resurrected Christ all over the known world. But the task is unfinished, Their commission is ours. It has never been rescinded. We, too, are to pray and witness. We are to go!

HOLDING THE ROPES is a call to pray and to give. When William Carey, one of the first missionaries from England, responded to the call to go to India, he agreed to go if those back home would hold the ropes. Praying and giving has been likened to holding the ropes for missionaries who go and nationals who are His witnesses. In Carey's day it was dangerous and precarious, and it remains true. The spiritual darkness is becoming more intense in our day. We need Lighthouses of Prayer both at home and aboard to push against the spiritual darkness with the Light of the Gospel message. The quest is not for mere gold deposited down in the dark places, but the souls of persons, any one of whom is more valuable than the entire physical universe and far more precious to God.



# Congressman Bob Good (R-VA)



You may or may not be a person who makes, New Year resolutions, but you can use the thoughts for self-examination. After all, the unexamined life is not worth living, according to the ancient philosopher, Socrates. Seriously, Paul's admonition, speaking to believers in Corinth, was even more appropriate and relevant to any Christian, Let a man examine himself. You might couple this activity with David's prayer in Psalm 139:19-20 for a closer walk with God.

#### PASTOR'S PARAGRAPHS

Some folks say they don't believe in making New Year's resolutions.

Well, I do! Isn't it wonderful that God is giving us a new slate a clean slate on which to write a word or two and then comes night? I'm going to make some resolutions for the New Year [1960] and TO THE BEST OF MY ABILITY I'M GOING TO KEEP THEM.

Here are some soul-searching questions that might help us to see what resolutions are needed.

- 7. Have I tithed my income during the year? Would I be satisfied to have as my income in 1960 ten times the amount I gave to the Lord during 1959?
- 8. Have I been responsible for leading someone to Jesus during this year? <u>HAVE I TRIED</u> to win someone to Him?

- In what spirit have I received the destructive, as well as the constructive, criticism given me?
- 10. How deep is my thankfulness to the Lord and to all the persons He has used to be a blessing to me during this past year?
- 11. Have I faithfully attended the mid-week prayer meeting?
- 12. Do I belong to the Brotherhood or WMU?
  GIVE THESE QUESTIONS
  SERIOUS CONSIDERATION
  ONE-BY-ONE. Decisions
  determine destiny.

As I reviewed the questions sixty-one years later, I am in my eighty-sixth year of life (using John Wesley's method of measuring life). After giving serious consideration to each one, I resolve to put into practice the steps impressed upon me by the Holy Spirit through Paul's advice, Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has laid hold of

me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended, but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead. I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus (Philippians 3:12-14).

#### THE SOUTHERN AFRICA STORY



From 1996 through 2013, JGHM focused on Southern Africa under the leadership of Leslie Motsalane with headquarters in Welkom, Free State, South Africa. During this period, prayer seminars were conducted in eight nations: Botswana, Lesotho, Mozambique, South Africa, Swaziland, and Zambia. Besides the seminars conducted by Leslie and his team, Dr. Henry conducted 153 prayer seminars, spent 273 days in these nations and traveled 346,309 miles. Around \$250,000 was invested.
