These are the times that try men's **souls.** The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands by it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. What we obtain too cheaply, we esteem too lightly: it is dearness only that gives every thing its value. Heaven knows how to put a proper price upon its goods; and it would be strange indeed if so celestial an article as freedom should not be highly rated. — **Thomas Paine**, The Crisis, December 23rd, 1776

When **Thomas Paine** wrote these words in 1776, his concern was liberty from tyranny that was a very real reality for our forefathers. Fast forward to the reality for us in 2015. Some very wise observers speak of the effect of eminent decisions by the Supreme Court related to natural

marriage, homosexuality (encapsulated to LGBT— Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and lauded by many politicians although the actual number is said to be only two to three percent of our population) and samesex marriage as a clear and present danger to religious liberties and free **speech**. If the Court rules adversely, once the dust settles, Christians (people of faith) may be forced to make the same type of choice described in Acts 4. Read the account for yourself. When the Apostles were brought before the Jewish Sanhedrin for speaking the gospel after being warned to remain silent, they stood their ground" "But Peter and the apostles answered, 'We must obey God rather than men (Acts 5:29). Earlier Peter had laid the groundwork in his words to the officials, "Whether it is right in the sight of God to listen to you more than to God, you judge. We cannot help but speak in His name" (Acts 4:19-20).

Overwhelmed! Perplexed! Then what?

The Bible has the answer! Asaph was a musician to whom King David gave major responsibility in the worship at the tabernacle in Jerusalem. When David brought the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem, he placed the musical services into the hands of Asaph, Heman, and Ethan, each representing one of the three great Levitical clans. As the ark was brought into the city, these three sang and sounded cymbals. In the dedication service, Asaph led the musicians "to invoke, to thank, and to praise the Lord, the God of Israel" (1 Chronicles 16:4)

I remember the first awareness that I had of Asaph's testimony of a life experience that brought a deep sense of perplexity. He shared the experience in Psalm 73, one of eleven psalms attributed to Asaph. One of the responsibilities that I had at Rosedale Baptist Church, Richmond, Kentucky, where I served as pastor, was to teach the senior adult men's Sunday school class. It was the year that our son, Mark, was born 1959. The "tools" I depended upon to prepare a lesson were the Bible itself and two publications produced by the Sunday School Board (Broadman Press) of the Southern Baptist Convention. One was entitled Broadman Comments, an excellent commentary following the International Sunday School Lesson plan; the other was a small commentary written by Clifton J. Allen. To say I studied the passage to be taught diligently would be an understatement. I began the preparation for the next Sunday's lesson on Sunday and spent time daily getting ready to teach. By the way, I kept a set of Broadman Comments and Dr. Allen's commentaries for the active years of my pastoral ministry (1953-1980) in my library and often turned to these invaluable Bible study tools. continued on page four Taking a stand

COLUMBUS, Ohio (BP) — The current and 16 former Southern Baptist Convention presidents released a statement on biblical marriage and the national implications of same-sex marriage in a June 17, 2015, news conference prior to the concluding sessions of the SBC annual meeting in Columbus, Ohio. SBC President Ronnie Floyd moderated the news conference, attended by eight of the former presidents.

The full statement follows:

As Southern Baptist Christians, we are committed to Biblical faith and ethics. As a result, this body of Believers stands on the authority of Scripture and God's Truth as central to our lives.

What the Bible says about marriage is clear, definitive and unchanging. We affirm biblical, traditional, natural marriage as the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. The Scriptures' teaching on marriage is not negotiable. We stake our lives upon the Word of God and the testimony of lesus.

Consequently, we will not accept, nor adhere to, any legal redefinition of marriage issued by any political or judicial body including the United States Supreme Court. We will not recognize same-sex "marriages", our churches will not host same-sex

ceremonies, and we will not perform such ceremonies.

While we affirm our love for all people, including those struggling with same-sex attraction, we cannot and will not affirm the moral acceptability of homosexual behavior or any behavior that deviates from God's design for marriage. We also believe religious freedom is at stake within this critical issue that our first duty is to love and obey God, not man.

Therefore, we strongly encourage all Southern Baptist pastors, leaders, educators, and churches to openly reject any mandated legal definition of marriage and to use their influence to affirm God's design for life and relationships. As the nation's largest non-Catholic denomination with over 16 million members, we stake our very lives and future on the Truth of God's Word.

We also join together to support those who stand for natural marriage in the corporate world, the marketplace, education, entertainment, media and elsewhere with our prayers and influence, and resource

These books are among the ones that are now in the J. Gordon Henry Collection at the Hogue Library, Northeastern Baptist College, in Bennington, Vermont.

When we came to Psalm 73, I was somewhat shocked to learn that one of the chief musicians who led worship admitted in writing that he had become so perplexed and overwhelmed almost to the point of "throwing in the towel." His confusion started when he became preoccupied with thoughts related to how well off the wicked were lots of money, plenty of pleasure, no troubles. Soon he was wishing that he were like them!

Asaph found the answers when he went into the sanctuary. One can paraphrase Psalm 73:17 thusly: "Then something wonderful happened. One day I went into the sanctuary of God —not the literal temple in Jerusalem but the heavenly one. I entered there by faith. As I was complaining to the Lord about the prosperity of the wicked in this life, the question suddenly flashed across my mind, 'Yes, but what about the life to come?' The more I thought about their eternal destiny, the more everything came into focus." He acknowledged that he then understood that the things that were causing him to feel envy were mere shadows. Becoming agitated and bitter over the seeming prosperity of the ungodly was stupid and in questioning God's justice, he was acting more like a beast than a man. His behavior was ignorant (vv 21-22).

But in spite of ignorant behavior, God did not forsake Asaph. "I am continually with You, and You hold on to me, like a father holds his child by the hand. Throughout all my life, You guide me with Your counsel, and then at last You will receive me to glory" (vv 23-24). He had come to the place that he had no desire for anything on earth apart from God. He expressed that he was satisfied with God and found his all-sufficiency in Him. One can almost hear him declare, "My body may fail, but God is the strength of my life and all I'll ever need or want throughout eternity. As far as I am concerned, I want to live as near to You as possible. I have committed myself to You for protection, and I want to declare all Your wonderful works to anyone who will listen" (vv 25-28).

It was in that men's Sunday school class over fifty-five years ago that I learned the lesson to look at life with eternity's values in view. That understanding has made me a better preacher, teacher, and counselor to those with Asaph's questions whom God has sent into my life. Remember your Bible has the answer! Don't forget to look there when OVERWHELMED and PERPLEXED.

In Martin's Steps

As you know, there is limited space in any one edition of the Reflector. Many of you have heeded my request for prayers for guidance as to the content for which I remain grateful. It would not be difficult to fill each page of the Reflector focusing on the work that Martin Shikuku. **Eldoret, Kenya**, is doing. Not only does he have the world on his heart. he has a deep burden for East and Central Africa's people and a deep commitment to match his concern. His own local church, Glory Baptist Church, which he founded on the outskirts of Eldoret, a city in the beautiful Rift Valley (where the long distance runners that often come in first place in competitions around the world train).

For the past nine years, Martin has been a friend and a colleague. He is now the director of JGHM-East/Central Africa Branch His wife is Anne. Martin and Anne have four children. The growth of Glory Baptist Church is a thrilling story. He and his leaders have patterned their work using the structure laid out in the prayer seminar ministry. Martin is a full-time pastor. He is a leader in the Baptist Convention of Kenya, He and Anne have founded a school and an institute for preachers. I know first hand that Martin "practices what he preaches." As you read the section devoted to East/Central Africa in the recent President's Perspective (Report 123, Meeting 126, June 19, 2015) prepared for the JGHM Board of Directors, you will see why we are thrilled to having Martin leading our work in East/Central Africa:

"b. East/Central Africa. Although we sometimes focus on Kenya, Martin Shikuku and his team are committed to the entire East/Central Africa region: Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and South Sudan, Martin envisions **Lighthouses of Prayer** shining brightly to bring light and hope to the nations. Reading his detailed monthly reports is like reading Paul's reports of his missionary journeys in the Book of Acts. His personal commitment to his own spiritual life and his commitment to his pastorate shine out and attest to what God can do through a servant who answers His call.

"At the beginning of January 2015, a major concern was transportation. Due to problems with his van, he and his team resorted to public transportation for both the pastoral duties he has with Glory Baptist Church and the Baptist Convention of Kenya and the teaching duties of the prayer seminar ministry. Other needs at the onset of the new year including building a pastor's home (which church has voted to do) and adding three classrooms for the school, and expanding the children's orphanage. As he shared his thoughts at the beginning of the new year, he said: "We are for sure struggling and the need is high each year. The main thing before me is transportation. Carrying the workbooks with public means is indeed troubling. We are still prayerful and hopeful. Glory Baptist Church leadership have finally resolved to build for us a house in 2015 and to rest us from a rental house each month. Keep us in prayers on the same.

The Lord remains GOOD to all. He has led us throughout the year 2014 and we praise Him. The Lord is helping us in all. Pray for me that God will provide for I must have three classrooms built by Monday, January 5th, for the children in the orphanage to start learning. Pray for us for we do not know where to start."

"An example of what God is doing in his own local church in Eldoret (Glory Baptist Church) is captured in a February 2nd report of happenings on Sunday, February 1: "Yesterday was a good Sunday for me, though weary. I was busy from Friday with our monthly over-night prayer meeting followed by baptism of 14. Thirteen churches were represented, including nine pastors. Five people gave their lives to Jesus in Sunday morning services." His church planted six new churches in 2014.

"During the first quarter, there were seven prayer seminars. The goal for each seminar is 100. (1) February 21 at Glory Baptist Church-Baharini, Pastor Ketus Wafula. 133 attended. 27 churches, 53 pastors, 9 professions. February 22 was the first anniversary of the church and Martin joined in the celebration. Martin shared: "We had a very wonderful moment at our one-year old church. It was a very active class throughout as the classes are when you are here teaching. They were very open to learning." (2) February 28 at Glory Baptist Church-Moi Barracks. Pastor Patrick Luseneka. 103 attended. 42 churches. 31 pastors. 19 saved. (3) (4) (5) (6) (7) March 24-29. Mombasa (resort city on the Indian Ocean 560 miles from Eldoret; TRAVEL BY BUS SINCE

VAN IS NOT WORKING/sleep overnight on bus). SEMINAR 1. Mijomboni Baptist Church. Pastor Emmanuel Kazungu. 137 attendance, 32 pastors, 11 professions. Seminar 2. Shariani Community Church, Pastor James Shanzu, 74 trained, 7 saved, Seminar 3. Kibaoni Church. Pastor Wilson Charo. 59 trained. 11 pastors. 9 saved. **Seminar 4.** Christ the King of Host Church. Pastor John Vidide, 175 trained. 51 pastors, 19 saved, **Seminar 5.** Maximum Baptist Church. Pastor Robert Mangi. Record unavailable at time of writing. "Sunday: We are to finish at 3 p.m. and quickly move to catch a Mombasa to Eldoret bus at 4 pm sharp to be in Eldoret on Monday morning."

The following is from Martin's recent ministry in Tanzania, Monday, June 8- Monday, June 15:

EVENING GREETINGS:

Wednesday, June 17. I am in Psalms 74-76; tomorrow 77-79. It has all been a good start again from yesterday, Tuesday.

REPORT: We left Eldoret on Monday the 8th at 5am arriving at Sirari boarder at 11am. We crossed Kenya quickly only to find that power was off on the side of Tanzania thus becoming a very long delay of signing in our travel documents especially the van papers up to 4:30 in the evening which was too late and bad for me since I don't like at all driving in darkness. I will also need to trust God to clear the van payment so that the van log-book can be transferred into my name. For it being in the name of the company that imported the van for us, we were charged \$20.00, which was not at all in our budget, almost causing havoc since we had limited funds for this mission trip. We left at 5pm arriving Mwanza at 10pm(1000 kilometers). God is good that my Timothy, Pastor Martin Kiniali, had gone before us like last time when I went there here with you and so the arrangements to welcome us, truly

refreshed us so much. Took shower, ate supper then into bed at Pst Matrida's house. Mosquitoes were not good on us at all but thank God that we were to be up by 3:30 am, prepare and leave at 4am to the bus stage for a bus to Kigoma. The road is totally rural. I avoided driving our van, which turned out to be a very wise decision. At 5am, the bus left Mwanza, crossed Lake Victoria by the ferry at 5:30 and then on the road for twelve hours up to Kigoma town on the Lake Tanganyika at 5pm totally tired, sunny, hot and dusty (1120km). Our host Pastor Kakozi Ngolo was there at the bus stop for us. A total of 2120km.

We managed to conduct three Prayer Seminars instead of the five we had planned;

Wednesday 10th: Pwani Baptist Church. 197 trained, 73 pastors 17

Saved.

Thursday 11th: Kerewa Baptist Church- Murufit area. 77 trained, 11 pastors, 9 salvation (70 KM travelled).

Friday 12th

At Kasulu Baptist Church-Murubona area. Host Pst. Amineri Bulomera.112 trained, 51 pastors,19 saved 50Km travelled

Same Friday 12th, we visited the refugee camp and shared the gifts of clothes our church had given on Sunday the 31st May. Anne enjoyed this so much to serve Burundians, Congolese and Rwandese in the camps from 4pm to 6pm. We slept at Kasulu where we left the following day on 13th Saturday very early after mission now back home. This was the most difficult trip ever in my life. We reported for the bus as scheduled at 6:30am only to wait for the bus to arrive at 8:30am. We left at 9am expecting to arrive Mwanza at 9pm only to arrive the following day on Sunday the 14th at 4am.

The bus had mechanical problems being repaired twice on the road. Quickly at Pst Madaha's house where we took a bedrest up to 9am then prepared for church service at 10am.

The following day on

Monday the 15th, it was now Mwanza to Eldoret and we were slow to leave. God is good that we reached the border, crossed at 5pm, and by 11:35 at night we were at home in Eldoret. Anne developed some colds and coughs but improving from today evening after medication. I have felt headaches and weak the whole of today and remembered the mosquitoes and I have began taking malaria dose this evening. Keep us in prayers. The refugees really need our prayers and assistance. Pray for them. It all reminded me of Kenya in 2007-2008. Thanks for standing with me to stand again.
