Perspectives

Christians are commanded in the Bible to read the Bible which is the Word of God. Did you know that and are you obeying the command? The bottom line in Christian living is obedience. When God gives us a command, we do not have three choices; rather, we have two choices — to obey or disobey. Disobedience is sin and rebellion. Can we expect God's blessings upon our daily lives if we are in rebellion? I think not.

Moses, in speaking of the Word of God, wrote, ".. and he shall read therein all the days of his life" (Deuteronomy 17:19). The prophet Isaiah wrote: "Seek ye out the Book of the Lord, and read" (Isaiah 34:16). The Lord Jesus Christ Himself said, as He used the Word against Satan's temptations in the wilderness experience, quoted Deuteronomy 8:3 when He said, "It is written, 'Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). The Apostle Paul, in strong language to Timothy (and to us as well) admonished: "Study to show yourselves approved unto God" (2 Timothy 2:15).

Christians cannot do what God requires when they do not know the Word of God. It is simple as that! Perhaps the single greatest threat to the Church in America today is the neglect of the Word of God.

After twenty-four years in the pastoral ministry, I discovered a helpful truth that has since guided my direction in ministry—both in the pastorate and later in an itinerant ministry. I discovered that my approach simply did not approximate the approach of the **Master Teacher**, **Jesus**. My approach was to use the Word of God to tell people **what** to do. Jesus not only told His hearers what to do, He told them how to do it. Ten percent (one of ten verses), for example, of the Sermon on the Mount (**Matthew 5**, **6**, **7**) deals with prayer—how to pray and how not to pray. Since my very first sermon in 1953,

all hearers would testify that I preached the Word of God. In fact, I sprinkled the Word throughout my messages using many verses citing specific references.

I can assure you that many left my services on guilt trips because I hit them over the head with the Word of God! In 1977, I began to emulate the Lord Jesus Christ — sharing ideas about "how to" do what I was preaching about. What a difference this made in the lives of those who came under my ministry. It is not that pastors or teachers know all the ways to do it, but pointing the way changes lives.

Since January 1991, my goal has been to focus on not "what," but "how" how to pray for others (believers, family, pastor, the lost, the people of the world, the missionaries), how to worship (praise, adore) in prayer, and how to study God's Word as daily food for spiritual growth. For many the Bible is hard to get into. Therefore, it is neglected until things come along we can't handle which push us in the Word of God. When the emergency is over, it is easy to fall back into the old patterns. That is the way it is for far too many of us. Many are spiritually starving to death because they are substituting Sunday morning sermons (which often provide a quick emotional uplift) for personal study.

Let's look at practical approaches to employ in personal Bible study. One key to success is organization. One possibility is titling paragraphs, a method that places emphasis on major ideas or themes. It may be that the unit of study could be a chapter. There are 1,189 chapters. Don't be surprised if a chapter ends in the middle of a paragraph and deal accordingly.

Think of every Bible chapter as a file folder full of necessary information. The file needs to have an appropriate label. The caption used can then become your personal index. Titles can be written in the margins of your Bible, listed in a notebook (which

I do), or put on three-by-five cards. Four guidelines are suggested for choosing a label: Four words or less, **Original** to you, **Unique** to the chapter, **Retainable** for the big issues or events (acronym **O-U-R**).

Limiting the title to **four words** WILL force YOU to think carefully through the passage. What is the writer trying to communicate with his words? What are the essential points? If you are following the pattern of reading three chapters a day and five on Sunday to work through the Bible each year, you will not be overwhelmed and will be able to manage your portion for the day.

Original means your own label. Most study Bibles have chapter headings, but you may not always agree with an editor's conclusions. It is a good idea to ignore his labels until you've created your own.

Unique implies capturing one chapter's distinctive contribution to the Word of God. Don't be too general.

To **retain** the message of the chapter, it is important to summarize the major actions or ideas. Glancing at your chapter titles will remind you in seconds what the chapter is all about.

Sometimes a chapter is too complex and will need to be broken up paragraph by paragraph. When we lived in Tennessee, my wife's Sunday school class studied the book of **James**. When I was home, she often invited me to teach the class — which was a great blessing for me. I especially enjoyed the preparation which led me to spend considerable time in the book to my profit. Chapter one might be designated this way: vv 1-11: "External Trials Test Us", vv 12-18: "Internal Temptations Arouse Sin", vv 19-27: "Hearing Demands Action." You can combine these three concepts - "Trials/Temptations/Action" - for a chapter title.

If a title does not come quickly, don't belabor the effort. Jot down something quickly and move on! Many times your subconscious mind will mull over the chapter and other words will often come before you start reading the next chapters at another time.

Six questions can serve as an approach to content in a chapter for Bible study: *Who? What? When? Where? Why?* and *How?* You can make notes about all six or grapple with a few predominant ones as you study each passage. The day I am writing this copy, my reading is **Jonah**. It will be helpful to work through this book with the questions.

WHO'S WHO? Who are the major characters in this book? We can quickly count Jonah, the sailors, the ship captain, and the people of Nineveh. A broader view might also include God, the great fish, and even the hungry worm. Who is the human author and what do we learn about him from his writing? The book of Jonah is probably an autobiography, because Jonah's prayer in chapter 2 is a first-person account. He was a prophet, the son of Amittai, with a rebellious heart. He finally carried out God's will despite his prejudices. From chapter 2, we learn that the man knew and quoted God's Word.

WHAT'S WHAT? Most Scripture portions describe events — characters doing something. Others center on ideas — someone relating thoughts. Job, the Psalms, Proverbs, and the New Testament letters (Romans through Jude) emphasize ideas; most of the rest of the Bible highlights events.

What's the main event or idea of the passage in one sentence? **Jonah** tried to run from preaching in Nineveh, but he landed there anyway and the people responded.

What is the **sequence** of major events or ideas? 1. God called Jonah. 2. The prophet ran. 3. A storm arose. 4. The sailors threw him overboard. 5. A huge fish swallowed him. 6. Jonah prayed. 7. The fish spit him out. 8. Jonah finally preached. 9. Nineveh repented. 10. God spared the people. 11. Jonah complained. 12. A worm gobbled up Jonah's protection against the elements. 13. God taught Jonah a lesson. This list can be

as simple or as complex as you choose to make it. The chapter headings I chose are as follows: Chapter 1 - Running Away from God; Chapter 2 - Running to God; Chapter 3 — Running for God; Chapter 4 - Running Ahead of God.

What are some **significant words or phrases** in the text? These might be phrases that repeat, words that describe key thoughts, or words that need defining for clarification. In Jonah, the words *Lord, fear, prayer, flee, and but* are clues to important ideas.

WHEN DID IT HAPPEN? Jonah's account took place at the height of Nineveh's wickedness. The Jews felt threatened by this great city. According to a Bible dictionary, Nineveh was destroyed in 612 B.C.

Other "when" questions could be: How long did the narrative last? Where does it fit chronologically with the rest of Scripture?

WHERE DID IT HAPPEN? Jonah traveled from Joppa on his way to Tarshish; the Lord redirected him to Nineveh. A Bible map will help put this in perspective. You may also want to consult a Bible encyclopedia to find out how ships were constructed in that day or what the Mediterranean Sea is like.

WHY DID IT HAPPEN? What would we be missing if we did not have the book of Jonah. It pictures how much God loves every nation of the world. As a loving Father, He disciplines His wayward children. The account is also the backdrop for Christ's teaching in MATTHEW 12:38-41.

HOW CAN I USE IT? What specific lesson does God want to teach me from the text? How can I put it into practice in my life? From Jonah's unfortunate adventure, we see how crucial it is to obey God the first time He calls.

God never forces us to respond to Him. When Jonah was reluctant to preach in Nineveh, God put him in solitary confinement to reconsider his decision. He does encourage us in many ways to do His will.

Read, believe, and heed what you read. Growth, as well as salvation, depends

upon faith. "Without faith it is impossible to please God" (Hebrews 11:6). Faith is simply believing God will do what He said He would do.

Faith is necessary in understanding the Bible. That is where Israel, as a nation, failed. "The word preached did not profit them, not mixed with faith in them that heard it" (**Hebrews 4:2**). God is speaking through the Bible and we must believe God's Word. Do you?

If the Lord Himself personally visited you in your home or called on the phone, would you ignore Him? We dare not neglect His Word because He speaks personally to us in the Bible. Let's determine to say with Samuel, "Speak, Lord, for Thy servant heareth" (1 Samuel 3:10).

It's not enough to own a Bible — even if it is prominently displayed. It is not enough to carry the Bible to church! We must read as through our spiritual health depends on it — because it does!



"Tune my heart to sing your praise"

Since December 5-6, 1992, when I conducted a prayer seminar at the Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo, Texas, Chris and Kathy Seidlitz have been special friends. Dr. Chris was the head chaplain. Following a distinguished career in military chaplaincy, this unique couple serve the Windsor Park Baptist Church in DeSota, Texas. Both are dedicated soul winners and understand the purpose and power of prayer.

Kathy provides leadership in the prayer ministry of this great church through a variety of means. One is to include articles in their Sunday bulletin. The following article, entitled "Getting in Tune with God," appeared on May 16, the day the church hosted an "A Day in God's Courts" prayer seminar. Anyone who reads and heeds this article will see his/her prayer life strengthened.

There are times in our personal relationship with God that we just don't understand what He is doing. All the clichés, trite sayings and e-mail forwards just don't help in these times. Prayer is the key to bringing yourself and your will in line with God and His will. Through prayer, you are not bringing God in tune with you. You are actually getting in tune with God

Practical Steps for Getting in Tune with God

- 1. Ask God to reveal Himself to you as He really is. Knowing God is the key to getting in tune with Him.
- 2. Fill your prayers with praise to God. Praise releases the power of God into our lives (**Psalm 22:3**).
- 3. When you pray, spend more time focusing on God's character than on your circumstances (1 Peter 5:7).
- 4. Saturate your prayers with the promises of God. As you pray, fill

- your prayers with His promises. Make them personal to you and your situation (**Jeremiah 32:13-15, 42-44**).
- 5. Become thoroughly acquainted with God's goodness. The goodness of God prepares your heart to receive whatever God has in mind for you. When you are convinced that God is good, you know that whatever God does is good (2 Chronicles 5:13, 6:41; Psalm 25:7-8; 31:19).
- 6. Pray for the destruction of your self-centeredness. Much of our difficulty in accepting God's purpose rests in our own self-centeredness. We want our way. Pray that God would destroy the pride and self-centeredness and replace it with an humble and submissive heart (Mark 8:34-38).

Pray the Scriptures and you will pray the will of God.

Thank You, Doorkeepers!

From the beginning of the prayer seminar ministry, it has been my intention to never take our partners for granted. The monthly Doorkeeper Prayer Calendar has helped in achieving this goal. In those early days, I wondered if it would be possible to accept invitations from any group desiring a seminar (regardless of number or financial support). provide a prayer seminar workbook for each participant, to never sell the books/ tapes, but to depend on contributions to cover production costs. Here we are thirty years later operating fully as a faith ministry. It is possible because of the Doorkeeper Program. Thank you, Doorkeepers, for your prayer and financial support.

Recently I was reviewing back issues of our monthly publication to find the date someone became a **Doorkeeper**. I came across a letter that I wrote to the **Doorkeepers** on April 1, 1988. The sentiments expressed then are the very ones in my heart today and I want to share it with our readers.

Dear Doorkeepers:

"Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say rejoice" **Philippians 4:4**.

There are more things that I want to share with you this morning than you would likely want to read. My heart is so very full as I think of you who are partners in the prayer seminar ministry, of our Lord Jesus Christ who made a relationship with our Heavenly Father possible by paying our sin debt (trading places with us on the Cross), of the Holy Spirit who lives within us as our Helper (remember "Paraclete" is the Greek word in John 14:16 and is literally translated HELPER), and of the ministry to which He has called us. I, as did Paul, choose to rejoice!

When Paul wrote a thank you note to the Philippian believers, he was not in the presidential suite of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. Rather, he was in a Roman prison that was obviously dark, damp, and cold. You will remember that when he wrote his very last epistle to his beloved Timothy, he wanted him to bring his cloak and books (2 Timothy 4:13) and to "come before winter" (v 21). His response to what we would call "bleak" circumstances was to choose to rejoice. He said simply: "I rejoice and I will rejoice" (Philippians 1:18).

In developing the rationale for such rejoicing, in **Philippians 3**, Paul indicated that our rejoicing is not due to our earthly circumstances, but is due to the fact that we are found in Christ (v 9), can have fellowship with Christ (v 10), and are going to be fashioned like unto Christ (v 21). No wondered he rejoiced in that Roman prison! He had placed self and things on a dunghill (v 8).

Bob and Shirley Rose, Doorkeepers in Michigan, shared a clipping with me when I was guest in their home during the prayer seminar in Grand Rapids March 13, 1988 that really puts much into perspective. Let me share it with you:

Do you really want nothing but Christ? Is He truly everything your one purpose for living? Where is the dung heap in your life? Have you yet counted all things lost for the revelation of Him?

If you want nothing but Christ, your ministry is not your career. Prayer is! If He is all in all to you, you will refuse as wickedness the ladder of success! You will hide yourself away with Him! You will not have to be prodded to seek Him. You will go often to your secret closet, knowing the moment you walk in, you will worship. Oh, yes, you will sit in His presence, in no hurry, loving Him, worshiping Him, yearning after Him.

So many of us use Christ. We use Him to further our ministries, to build our own kingdoms. We trade on His name. God forgive us!

Do we love Him? Do we want only Him? Until you know that Christ alone is all you need and all you desire, don't go anywhere in His name! Settle that question first! All you have to give people is what you have of Christ

I'm sure that this has touched your heart as it has mine. Let's all determine to KNOW HIM and to MAKE HIM KNOWN as never before! This is my own reaffirmation and rededication today less of self and more of Him!

Now twenty-two years later, Shirley is with the Lord. Bob is still a faithful **Doorkeeper**. As I have examined my own heart again, it is my desire to live in the spirit of the article Bob and Shirley shared so long ago.

It has been said that God does not require a gold vessel. Neither does He require a silver vessel. He does require a clean vessel. To qualify, we must remember that man's righteousness is like filthy rags (Isaiah 64:6) and totally unacceptable. It is through the blood of Jesus that sins are washed away. Through faith we come to Him confessing known sin and receiving His forgiveness and His cleansing.
