Fanny Crosby was probably the most prolific hymnist in history. Through blinded by an incompetent doctor at six weeks of age, she wrote over 8,000 hymns. After her blindness, she said: "It seemed intended by the blessed providence of God that I should be blind all my life, and I thank him for the dispensation. If perfect earthly sight were offered me tomorrow I would not accept it. I might not have sung hymns to the praise of God if I had been distracted by the beautiful and interesting things around me."

In her lifetime, Fanny Crosby was one of the best known women in the United States. To this day, the majority of American hymnals contain her work.

Mission accomplished

On Monday, January 7, I wrote to the **Doorkeepers** and other friends about the post-election violence in **Kenya** and the devastation in **Eldoret**, the site of **Martin Shikuku**'s church and ministry. I began simply by saying, "My heart is broken." Just a few weeks before, the folks at Glory Baptist Church had worked hard to host many pastors and other Christians for the November prayer seminar. They did an excellent job on all fronts and the presence of the Holy Spirit was obvious.

A political conflict followed the December 27 election since it appeared that the election had been stolen by the incumbent president's party. Post-election violence exploded on December 30. The **Rift Valley**, one of the most beautiful sections of Africa, was the epicenter of much of the violence. **Eldoret** was one of the hardest hit cities. Houses and church buildings were burned indiscriminately throughout West **Kenya** with the **Eldoret** area one of the hardest hit. Many were forced from their homes and saw all their worldly possessions go up in flames. Some saw their loved ones killed, some hacked or burned to death, by men who called themselves Christians.

"And Jabez was more honorable than his brethren; and his mother called him Jabez, saying because I bare him with sorrow. And Jabez called on the God of Israel, saying, Oh, that Thou wouldest bless me indeed, and enlarge my coast, and that Thine hand might be with me, and that Thou wouldest keep me from evil, that it may not grieve me. And God granted him that which he requested." I Chronicles 4:9-10

Surely there are great benefits to be derived from studying the prayers that are recorded in the Bible. We can be sure that there is no greater source to be found to discover God's patterns for effective prayer than God's Word.

"Bible Examples of Prayer" is the title of session two in the prayer seminar. I point out that God's Word abounds with commands, examples, promises, and encouragements to pray. Not counting those in the psalms, there are 650 recorded prayers in the Bible; 450 have recorded answers. When you come across a prayer, ask yourself what you can learn for your own prayer life.

In session two, I use **Jabez** as the Old Testament example of prayer. He illustrates praying for oneself—petition praying. His prayer is one that most of us would do well to emulate. He was marching to another drum-beat as can be seen through a study of his significant meaningful heart-cry. He made a very earnest appeal for a blessing, and it was granted.

None of us knows very much about **Jabez** because his name is only mentioned three times in the Bible. He was from the tribe of Judah and some think that he was **Caleb**'s nephew. Hebrew writers tell us that God did bless **Jabez** indeed. He became a doctor of law and letters and was sur-rounded by a very important group of scribes who thought so highly of him that they named a city after him (**2 Chronicles 2:55**).

When I wrote the material about Jabez some thirty years ago, I termed the study, "Jabez ... AN EXAMPLE OF PRAYER. A MAN ALMOSTS NOBODY KNOWS." In 2000, Bruce Wilkinson, a graduate of the college I

was president of in New Jersey, wrote a small book for what is known as "The Breakthrough Series" entitled **The PRAYER of JABEZ** *Breaking Through to the Blessed Life.* The book became a **New York Times** best seller and millions of copies have been sold around the world. It is obvious that the prayer of Jabez strikes a chord in the heart of anyone who becomes familiar with it. The story of Jabez is full of interest. There is much to learn. I will highlight material from the Prayer Seminar Workbook study.

A. INTRODUCTION. 1. Name tucked away amid 500 names. 2. Compulsion to explain this man above all others. 3. Fewer than eighty words—yet it speaks volumes. 4. Simple facts stated, but no need to further explain. To personalize the account to our lives, I have THREE QUESTIONS built into the study. Question #1. If God listed our names, would He need to explain any one of us?

B. OBSERVE THE PROMINENCE THAT DESCRIBED HIM. "More honorable than his brethren." This means that his brothers were going in one direction while Jabez was going in the opposite direction. His way pleased God. Question #2. What if no one else is interested in prayer, would I be? Prayer warriors often work alone. This is the prayer of an honorable man.

C. OBSERVE THE PAIN THAT DESIGNATED HIM. His name means "pain." For some reason not known, his mother named him Jabez. Jabez clearly became sensitive to man's potential to do things that hurt others. His prayer literally is "Keep me from evil, that I may not cause pain." Question #3. What if there's pain involved?

D. THE PRAYING THAT DISTINGUISHED

HIM. 1. "And Jabez called on the God of Israel." A man is known for what he does most. To be recognized, he must do more of what he is known for than others. a. The <u>certainty</u> of his praying. b. The <u>consistency</u> of his praying. c. The <u>content</u> of his praying. 1) "Oh, that Thou

wouldest bless me indeed;" (a) Urgent (b) Personal (c) Daring. 2) "AND ENLARGE MY COAST," 3) "And that Thine hand might be with me;" 4) "And that Thou wouldest keep me from evil, that it might not grieve me;" 2. "And God granted him that which he requested."

Bless me. Frequently we, too, punctuate our prayers with the request that God "bless" someone or something. What do we mean when we PRAY FOR A BLESSING? Are we simply wanting God to make something work out right or to do something good? Or is there a deeper significance which, if understood, could add a new perspective to our praying?

In the Biblical sense, a "blessing" is an act of God by which He causes someone or something to produce supernaturally more than would be naturally possible. Isn't this truth obvious in the life of **Jabez**? He wanted a big blessing, not a little one. God granted him that which he requested. He prayed for, and received, spiritual prosperity. As you and I pray, what kind of blessing do we want?

Often we ask God to bless a service, or a pastor-teacher, which means that we want to see results which cannot be explained on the basis of human logic, or human talents or competencies. When we ask the Lord to bless a certain missionary or a certain mission effort, we are asking God to give the missionary the ability to accomplish more than is humanly possible and we want to see the mission effort produce fruits far beyond what man can bring by his own work. Praying that God bless an offering indicates a desire for God to superintend the use of those funds so that more is accomplished than would be if dispensed on the basis of human cleverness. We need God to bless our spouses, children, and our work. So we pray for God to bless them.

Truly God has blessed the prayer seminar ministry far beyond my own dreams—opening doors, providing traveling grace, and blessing each of the 1,312 prayer seminars with a special unction of the Holy Spirit. How my own heart palpitates with thanksgiving for specific blessings. May the sweet incense of prayers from believers whom He has blessed during

prayer seminars ever minister to Him for His pleasure. How desperately those around us and throughout the world need to see God's blessing on our work which can only be explained by His hand moving. As we pray for Him to bless, let's remember the possibilities!

More responsibility. Jabez wanted more responsibility—"AND ENLARGE MY COAST." If you and I are not careful, we will settle in at a level below what God wants for our lives. It is easy to have the "I taught last year" attitude and not want more responsibility.

God's hand. One of the most revealing things Jabez asked was for God's hand to be upon him. What a difference it is to walk through a day or an experience when you know God's hand is upon you. We, too, need to seek His hand in a deliberate way. Since God intends for us to order our lives around prayer, we must learn to ask Him to do so. His way in prayer has always been for us to confess to Him specifically what we want Him to do.

The matter of evil. Finally, Jabez asked that he be kept from evil since he understood the grief that could come. When a Christian succumbs to sin, he will lose the joy of God's salvation, as did **David**. When the Christian loses his joy, he does not worship well, walk well, work well, witness well, or war well.

God's response. Jabez is praying for himself. It is right for us to pray for ourselves. In fact, until a person is praying for himself, he is not in a position to pray for others. Some might look at what this man of God asked and dismiss each request as self-centered. It is important, however, to understand what God felt about what he asked. The conclusion is "And God granted him that which he requested." God is as interested in each of us, and our needs, as He was in Jabez. As Jabez took his needs directly to God, and obtained an immediate answer of His grace, we need to do the same. His prayer can be our model as we pray earnestly from our hearts.

As you deliberately seek to learn from each prayer recorded in the Bible, you will find none more helpful to guide your praying than the prayer of Jabez. We need to learn and make the prayer of this Old Testament's saint our own

prayer. Each of us is in deep need of fuller blessing, widening horizons of faith, and a more constant emancipation from sin's dominion. Through the prayer of Jabez, we can discover more of God's patterns for effective prayer.

Caution. While the prayer of Jabez gives us insight about what we can talk to God about, it is important to use his words as a guide, not something to be repeated from rote memory. Even the Model Prayer is not a prayer to be prayed as much as it is a prayer to teach us how to pray. Be sure your heart is in your words. Be sure that you are on praying ground with sins confessed and forsaken (Psalm 66:18).

One that I have pondered over more than any other is "I Shall Know Him" by the print of the nails in His hand. At this Easter season, let's reflect on what brought about those nailprints and determine to give Him our best.

"Understandest thou what thou readest?"

As we come close to Easter each year, I am deeply moved and amazed that God would give us such a gift of love and forgiveness in Christ. The death and resurrection of Christ are at the heart of our Easter celebration, and at the heart of the message we preach at home and abroad. Christ is risen! We serve a Risen Saviour!

On the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35).

When the two disciples walked on the road to Emmaus, they were discussing Jesus' death. Suddenly Jesus Himself was walking with them, but they didn't recognize Him. When He asked them what they were discussing that made them so sad, they told Him about Jesus of Nazareth, whom they thought was a great prophet and the Messiah. Now their hopes and dreams were dashed. He had been crucified and buried. Some of their group claimed that He had risen from the dead, but they could not believe it.

Jesus then told them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe in all that prophets have spoken! Ought not the Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into His glory?" Then Jesus quoted from the Scriptures beginning with the writings of Moses, explaining what the passages meant and what they said about Himself.

They wanted this stranger to join them for some food in their home. He did. When He took the loaf of bread, broke it and passed it to them, suddenly their eyes were opened. They recognized Him, and then He disappeared. They started telling one another how their hearts felt strangely warmed as they talked with Him. Within the hour, they were hurrying back to Jerusalem, where the other disciples of Jesus were waiting. We would do well to go once again to the Bible and reflect on the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus for our sins, which is the crux of the GOSPEL that we preach (1 Corinthians 15:1-8).

Were you there when they crucified my Lord? Before crucifixion, criminals were


commonly scourged with a whip made of leather thongs weighted with pieces of sharp metal until the flesh on their backs was all torn open. The whip was called "the cat of nine tails" and made furrows on the back (Psalm 129:3). Sometimes death resulted from scourging alone. After the beating, the victims were led to the place of execution through the city market place. When they arrived at some easily accessible knoll, they were made to lie down while they were bound to the cross-bar and their hands nailed. They were then lifted up by ropes or ladders and the cross-bar was attached firmly to an upright that had been driven into the ground. The feet were nailed to the upright, and the victim left hanging not more than two feet from the ground.

There was great mental anguish in hanging practically face-to-face with the curious and the sadistic that might mock and scorn at the cries of the dying.

Crucifixion was regarded as the most disgraceful, as well as the most excruciating manner of execution. The torture of the cross began with the sagging weight of the body that make breathing difficult, then impossible. The swelling wounds on the hands, feet, and lacerated back, the torn tendons and nerves, and the unsufferable thirst under the hot sun combined to bring torture beyond imagination. Arteries of the head and stomach would become surcharged with blood, causing a terrifying throbbing sensation.

The Lord Jesus Christ suffered one of the most ignominious, savage kinds of death known to man. But He died standing up in symbolic defiance of the powers of sin and Satan, crying with a loud voice, "It is finished!" He was made a curse for you and me that we might not have to bear God's curse on sin ourselves (Galatians 3:13).

Were you there when they laid Him in the tomb? Sue and I have had the privilege to lead tour groups to the Garden Tomb in Jerusalem and enter the tomb and pause before the ledge upon which His body was placed. But the tomb is empty and the stone is rolled away!



Were you there when He rose up from the grave? "And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here; for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell His disciples, that He is risen from the death; and behold, He goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see Him; lo, I have told you so" (Matthew 28:5-7).

Up from the grave, He arose. He lives. Christ is risen indeed. When the glorious sunrise of Easter morning comes, we shout, "**He is risen!**" The resurrection of Jesus Christ is what gives us hope as we look to the future.

Plain word for Christian leaders

"Stand before God for the people, so that you may bring their difficulties to God" (Exodus 18:19). "Show them the ways in which they must walk and the work they must do" (v 20). What is this? It is intercessory praying and teaching the Word of God.

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When the violence came into the Glory Baptist Church community, **Martin** was devastated and fled with his family to a police station in **Eldoret** to seek protection. The political conflict moved over into tribal conflict. **Kenya** was normally seen in Africa as a haven of relative political stability and economic prosperity. The nation had escaped the ethnic hatreds that consumed Rwanda, Congo, and Sudan. It was considered one of the most promising and stable African nations. The economy was flourishing.

The election aggravated deep-seated resentments that have apparently been festering for years. There are forty-two identified tribes in Kenya and may be as many as fifty, counting the smallest tribes. The United Nations estimates that at least 600,000 have been uprooted. Around 300,000 have gone to camps, police stations, stables and prisons. The living conditions are horrible. One Kenyan newspaper headline was "Now they're eating rats." Over 1,000 have been killed.

Martin and his family, along with everyone else, faced terror, suffering, anarchy, exodus, shortage of commodities/food, no shelter, no blankets, appalling sanitary conditions, and fear of disease outbreak.

Physical description (from February 8 E-mail)

"About the Glory Baptist Church community which you remember well, along the main highway starting about two kilometers from the hotel where you stayed while in Eldoret, the shops and houses have been burned down after being looted. There are burned vehicles everywhere. On the road to the church from the highway (the rough road beside the church), more than ten homes are totally destroyed. You may hardly meet a person walking there now. Immediately after the railroad crossing over sixty homes are totally destroyed by fire including that orphanage near the church. Of the 200 homes going up the hillside on the right side of the church, only eleven houses remain. There are no intact families remaining."

Doorkeepers and friends responded

Hearts were touched. Many sent gifts with messages to **Martin**, his family, and his congregation. "Don't despair. We are standing beside you with prayer and financial support. Over 100 gave over \$13,000. The very moment we heard from **Martin**, JGHM sent \$1,000 immediately. We have continued with weekly support and have provided funds to **Andrew Sakaria** (Misikhu), our other coordinator, and **Fred Indangasi** (Mombasa), our evangelist for the Misikhu crusade.



My heart is rejoicing

Now, a short six weeks later, "my heart is rejoicing." There is no doubt that the financial and prayer support have wrought a miracle. Our mission was to help **Martin** get reestablished, having lost everything in his home, which brought him to the point of despair.

Martin's own words

No words that I could use could surpass those of **Martin**. I will share highlights of his E-mails.

January 7. Praise God that I am still alive and my family. Ran to the police station on 31st. Whole village burnt. We have been sleeping outside on ground. No food, clothing, house. Everything looted from my house. My members are totally discouraged, hungry without a home, some with loved ones dead. My children escaped to **Pastor Andrew**'s house by the grace of God. I have found a small guest house in town and am trusting God for the money to pay for it for a month. The planned prayer seminars have been postponed. Went to church

on January 6. Thirty-one came for prayers, the lowest since we started on November 3, 1996.

January 15. Reported on January 13 services. Forty-one present. Sermon subject: "God Remembers." Used funds to buy food to distribute to members.

January 24. Used some funds to visit camps. Five Baptist churches burned. Thousands in camps. "We encouraged the pastors and people, prayed with them, gave whatever support we had in material and money form. We read God's Word and then sang "On Christ the Solid Rock we stand. Ministered personally to over 500."

January 28. "My heart prayer is that JGHM will live even if the Lord rests the founding president. As his Timothys, the small elephants, as long as we are still alive, we shall keep the main thing the main thing all over the nations."

February 2. "Nowhere seems safe. We had supper in our house, the first time since December 29."

February 4. "I am always lifted up with your encouraging E-mails to me. I feel not alone anymore. Insecurity is the main challenge/problem on my church field. Police are ineffective. We are now planning a long-term evangelistic project toward the "Kelenjin" community, the tribe that has been attacking people and chasing them out of the Rift Valley. I really love them and I see Glory Baptist Church as God's place for changing them through love starting with their children. We must move on in the Lord."

February 7. "Using Eldoret as our center, we plan to take the prayer seminars to Tanzania, Uganda, Burundi, Rwanda, Congo, Sudan, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Djibouti, Somalia, Malawi, and Central African Republic . . . I am very sure now that when my children come back to me on Friday, they will now at least see a home where can have a meal, sleep on a mattress covered

with a blanket, put on clothes and shoes—thanks to our Almighty God, JGHM, the **Doorkeepers** who have shown love, mercy and great concern in such times of our great need (**Philippians 4:16-19**). All of us Kenyans have been affected in one way or another. The violence language that is going around is "41/1"—41 tribes against one tribe (Kikuyu tribe)."

February 8. "Three major questions about violence in my country. #1. What is the nature of the conflict? Everything is a result of struggle for power/resources. #2. What are the causes? Election, tribalism, injustices, political differences, unresolved disputes, failed institutions that cannot be trusted. #3. What are the effects? Truly hurting, deaths, hate, psychological trauma, revived widened tribal hatreds, mistrust, suspicion, exploitation of resources, family separations, displaced people, lawlessness, environmental confusion, forced migrations to ancestral lands, and education.

As a result of the above, I feel much challenged that now I can start helping my people through a healing process beginning with myself, my family, my church, and then my society. I have fully agreed that as Kenyans we are deeply wounded. What we are now expecting is first scars as a result of our restored health after healing.

What has helped my church is that I have always been against tribalism from the very beginning in 1996. I have loved and valued all the Kenyan tribes and have involved them in church leadership which includes thirteen different tribes. This includes the Kalenjins who reside on my church field and have been responsible for much violence. In fact, I married into a different tribe. My children are more identified as Kenyans more than any one tribal identification."

February 11. "The Lord is still taking care of us in all situations. We retrieved our four children, **Lydia** (8), **Shalom** (5), **Becky** (3) and **Josiah** (1) from **Andrew**'s house. All were missing parental care and love and had colds and malaria. With the financial support, I took them to the hospital for medicine and have been

able to buy for them good meals. Now we are must get them settled into schools and are able to pay fees, buy uniforms, shoes, books, and school supplies. Everything in shops for basic needs has doubled in price. I am grateful knowing that over 100,000 children are suffering in makeshift camps. I am full of God's peace in all these atrocities. We are preaching and teaching forgiveness everywhere standing against any attempts for revenge."

February 15. 'We have had a good time with **Pastor Andrew** visiting us in our new house. Friends in the **Eldoret** immigration office are helping us with an international passport for Andrew, which is necessary as we take the prayer seminar to other nations.

February 17. "Yesterday was indeed a great day at the meeting house at Glory Baptist Church. As you saw it, it was full. I gave your greetings and words to the congregation asking each person to hug one another on behalf of Dr. Henry, Sue and JGHM. I tell you, it was lovely to see all those tribes that have been fighting present. I have my tribe, the Luhya; the current president's tribe Kikuyu; the Rift Valley fighting men Kalenjins; the socalled opposition leaders' group, the Luos; the Kisiis; the Mijikendas from the south coast of **Mombasa**: and the **Turkanas** from the northern sides of Kenya towards Sudan. Together we sang "Yes, God is good, He's good to me" in our diverse dialects reminding my people that our diversity is part of what makes us different, unique, and beautiful before God, and other men."

Conclusion: Although things are not back to normal—not by a long shot—Martin is reestablished. I firmly believe that what he, his family, and his congregation have gone through is boot training for a significant work among many African nations as he, along with his good friend and colleague, Andrew, carry the prayer seminar to many nations. You have made a tremendous difference. On behalf of so many in West Africa and Mombasa, the seacoast city, thank you for caring, praying, and giving.

A special thank you

A divine opportunity

When we received an invitation to conduct a series of prayer seminars in Pakistan in the fall of 2003, I thought "what an extraordinary opportunity. As I prepared, I prayed in this light and shared the invitation with our Doorkeepers. Soon I had an E-mail from **Doorkeeper Silas Yashim** in Nigeria: "We shall be praying for the Pakistani prayer seminars. It has been our desire for the Muslims in Islamic nations to hear the gospel. May this be a divine **opportunity** for the Muslims to hear the gospel as the result of the outcome of renewed, vital praying from those who attend the prayer seminars." From that point onward, I think of each seminar as a divine opportunity. Knowing the importance of Venezuela, the seminars scheduled March 16-30 are divine opportunities.

1992. Our first ministry in Venezuela was in Puerto Ordaz in 1992. In fact, I conducted prayer seminars # 500 and #501 on that visit. Although the churches were small, several pastors attended. This was the first time that we were able to give each pastor attending ten Spanish workbooks. Each promised to return to their churches and share what they had learned. Only eternity will reveal the results of this effort sixteen years ago.

Although we shared a number of testimonies in the **Doorkeeper Report**, these two are reflective of what was said. "I have learned in a short time many things that will help me from now on. I learned a more precise way of praying. The seminar was needed in my life. I am grateful and will teach my people what I have learned using the workbooks." "God has touched me so that I learned many things I did not know. He has shown me how essential Bible study and prayer are to having a victorious Christian life."

2007. Thanks to **Adam Nathanson**, missionary in Caracas and our long-time Spanish and Portuguese interpreter in many Latin nations, and the Evangelical Ministers'

Association, the 2007 seminars could not have gone better. The interest was unusually high. There were six prayer seminars, 2,633 in attendance (including pastors from all states in Venezuela), and 250 professions of faith.

2008. The Holy Spirit anointed each seminar in 2007 to the point that at the end of the first week, there was a firm invitation to return in 2008. The dates are March 16-30. The first week will be in Caracas, the capital city, and the second week in Meriba, a smaller, resort-type city in the mountains that is the home of many universities. Amazingly, I have received an invitation from the faculty of one of the universities to lecture on human development and higher education administration with around 200 students expected. The venue is full each day. We need your prayer support more than ever before.

One thing that is reflective of the building interest is the number of Spanish prayer seminar workbooks requested. Initially, the number was set at 2,000. As invitations came in from the churches, the number was raised to 3,000. A few days ago, we learned that we will need at least 4,000. Wonderful!

Help needed. The budget is \$5,400 to take care of travel, lodging, food, and the 4,000 workbooks. From previous experience, we have found that when one hundred **Doorkeepers** and **friends** become financial and prayer partners with us, the budget is met, and usually surpassed. Your help is vital to enable us to share the prayer seminar in other nations.
