# A clear insight in 1915

One of the oldest volumes in my personal library is entitled **The Christian Minister's Encyclopaedia and Pulpit Companion Volume II**. It was given to me in 1956, my junior year in college. It was published in 1915 by D. Appleton and Company for Sears-Roebuck and Company from the Sixth English Edition which means that the initial publication was in the late 1800's. It contains five hundred sketches and skeletons of sermons suited for all occasions along with nearly one hundred on types and metaphors. It is a virtual gold mine with inexhaustible nuggets of insight. I was blessed by Skeleton XVI (pages 38-39) and want to share with our readers.

# PRAYER

"Lord, teach us to pray." Luke 11:1

PRAYER is the duty of dependent creatures. Those who are self-sufficient do not need it. It is one of those signs which have ever distinguished the people of God. How desirable that we so understand it, as to excel in its holy and happy exercises. Its true spirit is from above; we cannot acquire it from men, or by mental research and skill. [One disciple], convinced of this, said to Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray."

### I. What is Prayer?

It is the presenting of our requests to God, either verbally or by lifting up our hearts to Him, and breathing out our desires before Him. In pray,

- The heart must be the agent. Without this, lip service will be an abomination to the Lord. Sincerity and earnestness must distinguish all our approaches to the throne of grace. Proverbs 28:9; 15:8.
- 2. God is the object of prayer. None else is possessed of those attributes which the Being whom we worship should possess: infinite knowledge almighty power unbounded goodness omnipresence, and such (**Psalm 65:2**).
- 3. Jesus Christ is the only medium of prayer. He is the way to the Father; by Him we have access; we must ask all things in His name, and expect all through His merits. He is the mediator between God and us.
- 4. Prayer must be our constant exercise. We ever stand in need God is ever ready to bless prayer is the appointed medium of communication (**Ephesians 6:18**).

### **II.** Why should we desire to be taught how to pray?

1. Because of the importance of prayer. Prayer moves the hand that moves all things. To be distinguished for prayer is the highest distinction we can receive. To be thus exercised is the safest, happiest, and most profitable of all employments.

The theme of the prayer seminar ministry has always been "A Day in God's Courts" (**Psalm 84:10**). In contemporary America, few Christians can say that they have spent a day in God's courts. Neither can they say that anyone has ever asked them to do so. The world is too much with us to take time to be holy.

You remember the story. After celebrating the Passover with His disciples in the Upper Room in Jerusalem, Jesus instituted the Memorial Supper (the bread and the cup) to be observed by His followers until His return from Heaven. The bread and wine of the Passover commemorated deliverance from Egypt. Jesus' body (**Matthew 26:26**) and blood (v 28) are now identified as the true Passover sacrifice of the **new covenant** (v 28) that brings deliverance from sins.

In His Upper Room Discourse (John 13-16), Jesus then gave His final instructions before He went to the cross. He taught them about the Holy Spirit and He taught them about prayer. Then He led them across the Kidron Valley to the Garden of Gethsemane on the side of the Mount of Olives. As He entered into the garden, He asked His disciples to "Sit here while I go and pray over there" (Matthew 26:36). He took Peter, James, and John with Him. Three prayers are recorded. After the first prayer, He returned to His disciples and found them sleeping. Addressing His remarks to Peter, He said, "What? Could you not watch with Me one hour?" (v 40). One hour! How can we come to the point that we can watch with Jesus in prayer one hour? That is the issue Joshua understood when he said to the children of Israel, "Choose you this day whom you will serve ... '(Joshua 24:14). The prophet Joel talked about "multitudes, multitudes in the valley of decision! For the day of the Lord is near in the valley of decision" (Joel 3:14). We must realize that there is a Valley of Decision for us, not only as we consider salvation, but as we consider following Jesus. Decisions determine destiny. The beginning point of spending an hour in prayer is deciding to do so. This is a decision that no other person can make for us.

When I was president of Northeastern Bible College, a student approached me in a hallway. His countenance was such that it was easy to see that he was full of joy. He shared that for the first time in his Christian life, he had spent an hour in prayer. Could you not spend one hour in prayer?

During 1976, I felt dissonance in my spirit. It was a year of significant progress at Liberty Baptist College, Lynchburg, Virginia, where I was serving as Vice President for Academic Affairs. It was a year of unprecedented blessings at Pleasant View Baptist Church, where I was serving as pastor. The dissonance was the realization that, although I was in "full-time Christian service" actually working for the Lord seven days a week I did not know God very well. In doing some serious introspection, I began to realize that I was only in the Bible to get a message to preach, not to know God. The Holy Spirit guided me to see that this was the root of my problem. Even my praying reflected a superficial understanding of the Word of God. Sadly, my praying was telling God what to do, when to do it, and how to do it. I did not understand that there are five elements of prayer adoration, confession, thanksgiving, petition, and intercession.

One Sunday morning, our soloist, **Dick Elmer**, sang "Teach Me to Pray" and the message penetrated. I began to pray, "Dear Father, will you teach me to pray, to really pray?" Clearly, this became a moment of decision for me. Since that day, everything that I have been involved in (both as a minister & educator) has included the area of prayer. What He has done for me, He will do for anyone who will let Him.

Once I began to understand the purpose and power of prayer, I bought every book I could find on the subject and began to read them studiously. They contained many excellent ideas on prayer that I incorporated in my personal praying. But I went a step farther. As I read the Word diligently, I asked Him to teach me to pray the way He wanted me to pray. I began to be alert to any Bible example of prayer that I read about in the Bible. Soon I had a long list of references for prayer experiences recorded in the Bible. I discovered that there are 650 recorded prayers excluding the huge number in the Psalms. 450 have recorded answers.

Now when I go back to some of the books, I find them even more helpful. One thing that I observed was that there are common principles running through the books, even though they are couched in difference expressions. I began to form my own expressions to incorporate into my teaching and preaching that I felt would communicate to the average Christian.

There came a point when I saw that I needed to make an effort to teach formally what I had learned. The culmination was a decision to prepare lessons as preparation for a twenty-four prayer chapel ministry. The basic concept was to mobilize 168 people, each willing to pray one hour a week in the chapel. Week by week, I wrote a lesson that I taught to our people on Sunday nights during the Church Training hour. This material was organized into a prayer seminar workbook in 1980 and is now available in many languages. Thousands upon thousands have had an opportunity to profit from what the Lord taught me over thirty years ago and what He continues to teach me. Although I have myself taught thousands, the Holy Spirit has called forth a number of teachers in many countries to teach this material

A basic question often asked is, "What is prayer?" Prayer can be defined as TALKING WITH AND TO GOD. In that sense, it is a two-way conversation between two people who love each other. It can be spoken or unspoken. It can happen when you are on your knees, walking about, or lying in your bed.

During this time, you can talk to God in a close, intimate way as you would your dearest friend. You don't need to use pious sounding words or phrases, but you can talk to Him in your natural way. When you visit your earthly parents, you do not converse in a stiff and formal way, you talk in a friendly, personal manner. When you come to God in prayer, you can converse with Him as a friend to Friend. relaxing and enjoying your time with Him. Actually, you do not even have to change the tone of your voice when you pray. Although we should be careful not to approach God casually for He is God you and I can come with childlike simplicity. After all, He is our Heavenly Father.

My friend, Jack Taylor, shared with me seven points, each very thought-provoking and challenging (Prayer Seminar Workbook, p 10). The last one encapsulates the essence of developing this Christian discipline: "The only way to learn to pray is to pray." Well said! I concur wholeheartedly, but I believe that it is useful to have some guidance as one begins to work toward spending one hour in prayer from time to time.

I would like to go back to the question that Jesus posed to Simon Peter in the Garden of Gethsemane: "Could you not watch with Me one hour?" When we were mobilizing believers to pray one hour in the prayer chapel ministry, many sincere Christians wondered if they could actually pray one hour? Some shared that they had little success the times that they attempted to do so. One said that he had set a timer intending to pray sixty minutes. After he had prayed everything that came to his mind and checked the time, he discovered that he had prayed less than ten minutes. Surprisingly, once the people began to pray kneeling at the altar in the prayer chapel following the established guidelines, their reaction often was "where did the hour go?"

Although it is my intention to spend considerable time in future articles on "how to spend one hour in prayer" and then "how to spend a day in prayer," I believe it will be helpful to share some thoughts from the sheet of instructions that I prepared for those praying in the prayer chapel. This material was included in the first prayer seminar workbook (p 79) that I prepared to use in the prayer seminars. It is seventy-nine pages and is still available through our office. I have slightly modified it for greater clarity.

### **PLEASE READ THIS FIRST** "Preparing to Pray"

1. ENTER THE PRAYER CHAPEL PRAYERFULLY. Sign in on the Check-In Sheet. Note that there is a passage of Scripture. Please read it before entering into your prayer posture. WAIT ON THE LORD. "For since the world began no one has seen or heard of such a God as ours, WHO WORKS FOR THOSE WHO WAIT FOR HIM" (Isaiah 64:5 Living Bible).

Affirm His presence, become aware of His presence as you approach your prayer time. Thank Him for being here in the Prayer Chapel and thank Him for allowing you to go kneel before Him on His throne in the Throne Room in Heaven.

2. READ THE WORD. Read these passages thoughtfully, prayerfully, carefully, and expectantly: John 15:1-7; Psalm 138:23-24; Matthew 5-7.

**3. PRAISE THE LORD AND THANK HIM**. We praise Him for who He is; we thank Him for what He does.

**4.** Begin by praying for yourself. There must be **CONFESSION OF SINS**.

1) Ask God to show you your sins. Make your sin list write them down on paper as the Holy Spirit makes them known to you. Think about your sins and list them!

2) After you have written down all you can think of, pray through **Psalm 139:23-24**, asking God to reveal anything that you have overlooked.

3) After you have written down all you can think of and all that God reveals to you, <u>CONFESS THEM TO GOD ONE BY ONE</u>.

4) After you have sincerely confessed every known sin and received His forgiveness and cleansing, <u>THANK HIM FOR HIS</u> FORGIVENESS.

**5.** NOW YOU'RE READY TO PRAY! Now turn to the double Rolodex on the altar. One the left side, you will find cards for the members of our church. You will note a paper clip is placed on a card. That is where the last person finished praying. Plan to pray at least fifteen minutes for the members by name. Although the Holy Spirit will often impress specific things on your mind as you look at a name, consider praying the Scripture that is on the check-in sheet which you read when you first entered the prayer chapel. Focus the power of God on each person. That is what intercession is. This process is to be followed continually so that every hour will see someone praying for the church members.

You will see a stack of "We're concerned cards" on the altar containing special prayer requests that have come into the chapel. These cards will include prospects both unsaved and saved who need our prayers. Many are prospective members of our church. Other cards will have specific prayer needs that have been called into the prayer room.

# 6. PRAISE THE LORD FOR HEARING YOU!"

Some of the prayer warriors reported that during their first hour in the prayer chapel that they could do nothing but weep. Surely, the presence of the Lord was with them. The power of God was evidenced on the first Sunday after we had prayed one week in the chapel. There were nineteen people saved.

# Don't touch the glory!

"But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." Matthew 6:33

For over twenty years, it has been my custom to choose a verse for the year to guide my thoughts and actions. My 2009 verse is contained in the Sermon on the Mount. I have often thought it would be appropriate to use as a header on a daily "to-do list." It is the reminder that I need to keep me focused day in and day out. One commentator said that it means "to desire God's righteous rule on earth." For me. it has an element of prioritizing and then seeking for holiness in daily living. It calls of making the things of God our paramount concern. There is no need to become overly concerned for the things of life; we need only to trust Him and follow His way of living.

Certainly, the beginning of a new year is the time to look back over the old year and count blessings. For 2008, it would be impossible to count all the blessings God has bestowed upon our ministry. He has opened doors and given the strength for each seminar. His provision has been more than ample; it has been abundant. JGHM has been blessed to touch many lives with the Word of God. But there is something that we must remember.

You may have followed the celebration of **Billy Graham**'s ninetieth birthday in December. One thing transpired that spoke to my own heart in a powerful way. At a dinner a few days after his birthday, in the presence of family and many longtime friends, he was presented 120,000 e-mails and letters expressing love and best wishes from people around the world. Many contained personal stories of the impact the Billy Graham ministry had on their lives. To help him get started, a sampling was presented to him in bound volumes. Because of macular degeneration, reading is a challenge, but his secretary and others will read aloud to him.

Indeed, this was a joyous occasion. During the celebration, **Cliff Barrows** and **George Beverly Shea** (now 100) led the guest in enthusiastic rendition of "Happy Birthday." Reminiscing at the dinner about decades of ministry together, Cliff recalled that when a Crusade or other event seemed especially successful, when the response was high, Billy would gather the Team and remind them, "Don't touch the glory. It's not ours; the glory is God's alone." The Holy Spirit spoke to my own heart as I read this story. This is an example that anyone who has a ministry should remember.

Certainly, JGHM has been used of the Lord to share God's Word with many people around the world. I have often said that I wish that all our **Doorkeepers** could accompany me on one trip so that they could see with their own eyes and feel with their own hearts what God is doing. When a year is ended, our tradition is to review the events of the twelve months just past. I am glad to report that 2008 has been a blessed year. As we seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, we can be sure that we are on the right path—the path of His blessings.

We should desire to learn how to pray

- 2. Because of our natural ignorance of this duty. We know not how to pray, or what to pray for as we ought (**Romans 8:26**).
- 3. Because God desires us to be proficient in this duty. "Open your mouths wide." If ye have not, it is because ye ask not, or because ye ask amiss (James 4:2b-3).

**III.** Why should we desire the Lord to "Teach us how to pray"?

- 1. Because He was distinguished for this His holy exercise. He prayed in public and in private when He preached or wrought miracles, when He was baptized, tempted, and transfigured; and His dying breath was employed in prayer. Who then so fit to teach us how to pray?
- 2. Because He is our Master, and in all things we ought to hear Him. He has taught us how to act in times of trouble, persecution, and adversity; how to act towards our friends and enemies. And He has taught us, likewise, how to pray: "When ye pray, say after this manner ..." Luke 11:2-5.
- 3. Because with Him is the Spirit of prayer. That Spirit that He promised to send as a Comforter is the Spirit of prayer: "For the Spirit Himself maketh intercession" **Romans 8:26; Zechariah 12:10.**
- Because He is our great High Priest. "He ever liveth to make intercession for us" (Heb. 7:25). He presents our prayers removes their imperfections He offers them with the fragrant incenses of His own merits and thus renders them effectual. Rev. 8:3.

### APPLICATION

(1) Let us cultivate the gift of prayer; (2) covet the true spirit of prayer (1 Corinthians 7:5); (3) commence and conduct all our affairs in connection with prayer (Philippians 4:6); (4) Continue instant in prayer (Luke 18:1); and (5) In the exercise of faith look for the returns of prayer.

# Cancelled debts

In my early ministry, Sue and I had the privilege to meet one of the greatest preachers who ever lived, **Dr. Robert G. Lee**, pastor, Bellevue Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee. We had gone to hear him in Lexington, Kentucky. That year our church had one of the highest baptismal ratios to membership in the Kentucky Baptist Convention. It was in that context that we were introduced to Dr. Lee. He showed great interest is us. Then we went on our way.

Years later, we again went to hear Dr. Lee preach. This time it was in Virginia. When we went by to shake his hand, Sue and I were amazed that he called us by our first names. His command of the English language was the most profound that I have ever experienced. Even today, I sometimes listen to one of his sermons on tape, especially "Pay Day Someday."

In his book, **Choice Pickings** (Zondervan 1961, p33), a book of sermon illustrations, he shared one that was simply called "Sumner's Statement." **Dr. Robert L. Sumner**, who lives in Lynchburg, is editor of **The Biblical Evangelist**, one of my favorite periodicals. I regard him as one of the great evangelists of all time. Here is the illustration:

The spiritually-minded and spiritually-aflame evangelist, **Robert L. Sumner**, makes this joyful statement about cancelled debts. He tells of a doctor who died in Chicago and left a will behind which completely wiped out all the unpaid medical fees owed by his patients. **Dr. William V. Gooder** wrote: "Having practiced medicine and surgery for forty-five years in Marengo, I hereby cancel and forgive all unpaid medical fees owed me by any and all former patients."

The attorney who filed the doctor's will estimated that the unpaid bills totaled around \$25,000. The doctor, who died at 79, left an estimated \$100,000 estate.

As Sumner states, the good doctor's actions completely and finally cancelled every one of the debts. No heir can ever in the future collect a single dime of the \$25,000 total. The once-indebted ones are forever free from the obligations.

Sumner says: "In a much grander and nobler sense, of course, that is part of what happened on the Cross of Calvary. There our staggering debt of sin was cancelled once and for all in behalf of each individual willing to accept it." "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to His cross" (Colossians 2:14). That is the way Paul expresses it.

What a thrill to know that the payment accepted for sins need never be made again. Sin once forgiven is sin forever forgiven. And God never *has*, never *can*, never *will* demand two payments for one debt. And it makes us to say, in gratitude, what the Psalmist said: "My lips shall praise thee" (**Psalm 63:3**).

### Home with the Lord

We recently received word of the Homegoing of Phyllis Reed (Derry NH). She became a Doorkeeper during a Bible conference that I led August 1-5, 1983, at the Rumney Bible **Conference** in New Hampshire. That week was sponsored by Conservative Baptists, with many pastors and their families present. When I was informed of Phyllis' death, my mind went back to that wonderful week and the day that I met Phyllis and discerned that she was a precious child of God. Over the years, until her health began to fail, a letter and a contribution came from Phyllis almost every month. From time to time, she telephoned us. As we journeyed to other nations, we could always count of her financial and prayer support. We will miss her, but rejoice that she is now in her Heavenly Home with her heavenly Father and her Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

During that week twenty-five years ago, God gave us two more **Doorkeeper** families who have been among the most faithful partners we have had: **Willis & Carol Snow** and **Nellie Shepard. Willis** is now in heaven. **Carol** and **Nellie** remain faithful **doorkeepers** one quarter of a century later.




