

THANKSGIVING 2018—THANKFUL FOR THE PRAYER SEMINAR MINISTRY AND THIRTY-EIGHT YEARS OF BLESSINGS

Thanksgiving is one of the five elements of prayer (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Seeking for self Petition and for others Intercession). In introducing this element during a prayer seminar, I state that "thanksgiving is one element that I should not have to teach since everyone should be thankful for blessings so bountiful that they cannot be enumerated. But I suppose that I must teach it in the light of Jesus' teachings in Luke 17:17: 'Were there not ten [lepers] cleansed? Where are the nine?" Just is the extent of ingratitude? Does this mean that nine out of ten never thank Him for His blessings? Perhaps! It is crucial that this element be clearly taught and implemented in daily living. Actually, thanksgiving does not change God, it changes the one who expresses thanksgiving. When you feel overwhelmed and great pressure, TRY THANKSGIVING!

The psalmist reminded his readers "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits" (Psalm 103:2); "Oh, give thanks to the LORD, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever" (Psalm 118:1); ""Through the LORD'S mercies we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not, they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness" (Lamentations 3:22-23). Actually, the parameters for thanksgiving are clearly set in 1 Thessalonians 5:18: "In everything give thanks!"

In daily praying, a very practical idea is to thank God for one of His benefits in the key areas of life and tell Him why you are thankful: physical,

The Greatest Blessing "Thank You, Lord!"

As Jesus died, He cried out, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Mark 15:34)

From 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., the Lord Jesus Christ suffered crucifixion hanging on a cross outside the city walls of Jerusalem. "Man of Sorrow, what a name, for the Son of God who came, ruined sinners to reclaim. Hallelujah, what a Savior." During this time, there were seven sayings from our blessed Lord, each worthy of pause and reflection.

During this 2018 Thanksgiving Month, let us ponder the meaning of His words. The New Testament gives us an explanation. Paul said that Jesus was made "sin for us" (2 Corinthians 5:21). In a moment of time, the dammed-up flood of human sin was released, and cascaded with awful force upon and into the Son of God.

In that exact moment, when the Son of God became sin for us, the Father looked away from His Son. For the first and only time in all eternity, the matrix of the one God, Father and Son were brutally torn apart.

So we know what the words mean. What we can never understand is what the experience they represent meant to Father and to Son. We can never plumb the debts of Jesus' anguish or sense the waves of pain that echoed out through all eternity.

We can never envision the corrosive scars that sin engraves on sinlessness.

All we can do is stand at the foot of the cross, hear that cry, and realize that what Jesus did for us cost Him more than we can begin to imagine. We say, "Thank You, Lord for the greatest blessing. Thank You, Lord!"

Dining at the King's Table

When I am helpless and hurting inside, the Lord is my shepherd to guard and to guide. When my heart's empty—my wounded soul bleeds, I shall lack nothing; the Lord meets my needs. When life seems confusing and out of control, He leads by the waters that quiet my soul.

AS THANKSGIVING APPROACHES

Perhaps it would be good to consider some ways to develop a

spirit of gratitude. The first Step is to remember the good things the Lord has done. Moses reminded the Israelite nation of God's past blessings in Deuteronomy 29. David celebrated God's wonderful works in behalf of Israel in Psalm 105-106. Stephen and Paul based their gospel appeals on God's track record of faithfulness to His promises in Acts 7 and Acts 13. Peter's last recorded words were reminders not to forget the precious promises and commands of the Lord (2 Peter 1:12-15; 3:1-2).

Another way to learn gratitude is to record God's blessings. It is said that George Mueller kept a prayer diary in which he recorded over 25,000 answers to prayer. It is good to take pen in hand and write down the good things the Lord has done for us. After a great victory over the Amalekites, the Lord told Moses to write down a report of the battle so that future generations would remember how God had delivered His people (Exodus 17:14).

It is also helpful to **recite** the benefits and blessings for which we are thankful. In **Deuteronomy** 6:7, 20-25 Moses commanded the fathers of Israel to recount to their children that it was God who had given them their houses, cities, cisterns, vineyards, olive trees and "all good things." He had brought them out of Egypt and He had brought them in to the good land that He had promised to their ancestors.

As I sit at my desk thinking about thanksgiving, I envision fathers and mothers gathering their children around them at mealtime and bedtime, traveling in the family car, or hiking in the woods together, enjoying the fall colors, remembering, recording

and reciting the blessings they have received from God's good hand—and thanking Him! Do you see what I see? God is good and enables us to receive His benefits.

Since we are entering into what we envision as the final twenty-three months of our active involvement in the prayer seminar ministry, the November 2018 REFLECTOR is a **SPECIAL EDITION** that provides Sue and me an opportunity to pause to give thanks to God for His blessings and to the many DOORKEEPERS whose hearts He has stirred to work with us to make the prayer seminars possible for the past thirty-eight years as well as the final two years that will bring us to forty years of leading the ministry beginning with the first prayer seminar outside our local church in September 1980.



There have been 70 prayer seminars in nineteen states (Alabama, Alaska, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, and Wisconsin) and three nations (Cuba, Pakistan, and South Africa). 

Stan's Legacy

There is not a day that goes by that I do not think about a life well lived that of **Stan Baskin** (January 25, 1953 February 27, 2018), who was a **Doorkeeper** for the prayer seminar for many years, along with his wife, **Emily**. He modeled what it means to be **A MAN OF FAITH**.

Émily recently shared one of the most precious stories I have ever heard. Her daughter, Ashley, recently presented her with an early Christmas gift. It is a wall hanging. Ashley took a photo of her dad's page in the "Thanksgiving Blessing Book" (November 22, 2017). One of her friends, who creates "heirloom pieces," made a wall hanging by copying Stan's handwriting exactly. It is the last two sentences that Stan wrote in his thanksgiving declaration that are highlighted.

Emily shared: "I rejoice that God would lead Stan to write these words of faith three months before he entered Heaven. Ashley knew this display of her Daddy's words in his handwriting would bring constant comfort. We serve an awesome God!"

I Must Tell Jesus

One hymn, I Must Tell Jesus, often comes to my mind. It was written by Elisha A. Hoffman in 1893. A minister's son, Hoffman attended Union Seminary in New Berlin, Pennsylvania, and was ordained in 1868. Afterward, he worked with the Evangelical Association's publishing arm in Cleveland, Ohio, for eleven years. He pastored churches in Ohio, in Michigan, and in Illinois. In his lifetime, he wrote over 2,000 Gospel songs including these that I have used in my own ministry for many years: (1) Are You Washed in the Blood? (2) Down at the Cross (3) Is Thy Heart Right with God? (4) Is Your All on the Altar? (5) Leaning on the Everlasting Arms, (6) No Other Friend Like Jesus and (7) Sing of Jesus.

Background. In his own words, Pastor Hoffman gave the background for I Must Tell Jesus. "There was a woman to whom God had permitted many visitations of sorrow and affliction. Coming to her home one day, I found her much discouraged, wringing her hands and weeping. She unburdened her heart, concluding, 'Brother Hoffman, what shall I do?' I quoted from the Word, then added, 'You cannot do better than to take all of your sorrows to Jesus. You must tell Jesus.'

For a moment she seemed lost in meditation. Then her eyes lighted as she exclaimed, 'Yes, I must tell Jesus.' As I left her home I had a vision of that joy-illuminated face ... and I heard all along my pathway the echo, 'I must tell Jesus, I must tell Jesus."

Hurrying to his study, Pastor Hoffman wrote the words and music under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. File this away because, sooner or later, you will face burdens and will need to tell Jesus.

I must tell Jesus all of my trials, I cannot bear these burdens alone; In my distress He kindly will help me, He ever loves and cares for His own.

Refrain:

I must tell Jesus! I must tell Jesus! I cannot bear my burdens alone; I must tell Jesus! I must tell Jesus! Jesus can help me, Jesus alone.

I must tell Jesus all of my troubles, He is a kind, compassionate friend; If I but ask Him, He will deliver, Make of my troubles quickly an end. Refrain

Tempted and tried, I need a great Savior, One Who can help my burdens to bear; I must tell Jesus, I must tell Jesus, He all my cares and sorrows will share. Refrain

O how the world to evil allures me!
O how my heart is tempted to sin!
I must tell Jesus, and He will help me
Over the world the victory to win.
Refrain

The role of music

Music is an excellent way to plant spiritual principles into our minds that will guide our responses to life's circumstances. Anyone who takes time to reflect on the truths embedded in the great hymns of the faith written by Pastor Hoffman would become an advocate of returning them to our worship services today.

One of the mistakes that churches are making is neglecting hymns of faith in favor of what is known as "contemporary Christian music" that often exalts man, not the Lord. Clearly, the Holy Spirit anoints words, music, and singing that helps us remember that God is our strength, our song, and our salvation (Psalm 118:14, Isaiah 12:2). Anyone who has the responsibility of choosing congregational songs would do well to lead believers in singing I Must Tell Jesus and other hymns Pastor Hoffman has written each stanza has a great thought, a thought that can guide us through the darkest night.

Four Powerful Reasons to Rejoice Psalm 42:1-11 Dr. Jim Britt

According to recent studies, over twenty-five million Americans suffer from depression, and it is one of Satan's most devastating weapons!

You might be interested to know that many of God's greatest servants have battled depression. Moses, Job, Elijah, and Jonah all became so depressed that they prayed to die. **Jeremiah** was so depressed that he cursed the day he was born (Jeremiah 20:10). King David struggled with depression and sorrow every day of his life (Psalm 13:1-2). Charles Haddon Spurgeon, the Prince of Preachers. suffered from acute depression until his death at the age of 57. Martin Luther battled severe depression all his life. At one point after three weeks of debilitating depression, his wife Katherine asked him, "when is the funeral? Surely God must have died." Hudson Taylor, the great missionary to China, during one of his struggles with depression cried out "I'm so depressed. I can't even pray!" His wife replied. "beloved, just lean back in the arms of Jesus, He'll see you through." Abraham Lincoln suffered from prolonged bouts with depression. Winston Churchill fought a lifelong battle with what he called the "black dog of depression." Even our precious Lord Jesus was not exempt from the enslaving clutches of depression. On the evening prior to His death on the cross. He cried out, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow, to the point of death" (Matthew 26:38).

But there is hope! When depression strikes, we must remind ourselves of the following four powerful promises God has given to His people:

- 1. HIS PRESENCE IS WITH US. No matter what we are going through, God is always with us. He is not a fair weather friend. Remember, Jesus was in the boat with the disciples when the storm arose (Matthew 8:23-27). The psalmist expressed his confidence when he said, "Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death; I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me" (Psalm 23:4). Jesus' promise to each of us is, "I will never leave you, nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5).
- 2. HIS POWER IS IN US. Many times there are situations or circumstances in our lives that we cannot change through our own energies or efforts. But we must remember that God can! Jesus promised His disciples that they would "receive power, after the Holy Ghost had come upon them" (Acts 1:8). Abraham, when told that Sarah would bear a child in her old age, was asked the question, "Is anything too hard for the Lord?" (Genesis 18:14). Always remember, "with God all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26).

- 3. HIS PROVISION FOR US. The apostle Paul assures us that "God will supply all our needs according to His riches in glory, through Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19). This includes our physical, spiritual, material and emotional needs. If the demon of depression has robbed you of your peace, remember God has promised to provide "peace that passes all understanding" (Philippians 4:7).
- 4. HIS PROVISION TO US. Many times we are so depressed that we feel that we cannot go on. But we must remember God's promise in 1 Corinthians 10:13, "God is faithful; and He will not let you be tested beyond what you can bear. But when you are tried, He will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it." Genghis Khan, the 13th century Mongol Conqueror, once asked his philosophers to come up with the most profound truth in the universe. After pondering over this for several weeks they came up with the following quote, "This too shall pass!" A dear lady was once asked by her pastor what her favorite verse of Scripture was, and she replied "And it came to pass." We must always remember that no matter how difficult our present situation is, "It too shall pass!" Claim God's wonderful promise in Psalm 30:5, "weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning."

George Frederick Handel, the great musician, lost his health; his right side was paralyzed; his money was gone; and his creditors seized and threatened to imprison him. Handel was so depressed by his tragic experiences that he almost despaired. But his faith in God prevailed. In his affliction, he composed, The Hallelujah Chorus, which is part of his greatest work—the Messiah.

So, dear child of God, hang in there! Do not let the enemy defeat you and rob you of what is rightfully yours through Christ. By the power of God, rise above your discouragement and depression, and claim the victory that is yours through our Lord Jesus Christ!

NOTE FROM DR. HENRY.

Since January 1987, I have counted William James Britt ("Dr. Jim Britt") as a close friend and colleague. Our friendship began on my first work with the Baptists in the Ibo tribe in Nigeria (Owerri, Imo State). The Nigerian mission was January 19-February 6. In a report dated March 2, 1987, to the Doorkeepers, I reported "There was an amazing harvest of Nigerian souls with 11,089 registered decisions for salvation. These folks stepped forward to receive Christ. Each prayed audibly the prayer of salvation submitting their names and contact information for extensive follow-up-souls who renounced all false gods. As the Holy Spirit moved, it was apparent that your prayers were being answered. There is no other explanation. Hearts were open to the Lord Jesus Christ and the Gospel. Although many children came to Christ, the only registered decisions were those 12 years and above. I had the privilege of preaching out in the jungle in a village. Over fifty were saved in the first service."

Although Dr. Britt did the work of an evangelist, he had a "pastor's heart" full of love, compassion, and total commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ and His Gospel. He was firmly established in the Word of God and was an unusually effective communicator. His passion including winning folks to Christ, bringing revival and renewal to the churches, and equipping young pastors for their ministries. He excelled in each of these areas. Jim Britt was a man sent from God for these times!

A few years later, Jim asked me to come to his church in Montgomery, Alabama for a prayer seminar. He had followed the establishment of J. Gordon Henry Ministries with great interest. During the visit to Montgomery, he asked if I would help him with the steps of establishing his own ministry. His W. Jim Britt Ministries was modeled on our Articles of Incorporation. The masthead of his monthly newsletter, Good News, recently encapsulated the extent of his ministry: CELEBRATING OVER 50 YEARS OF MINISTRY IN OVER 50 COUNTRIES. One of his most fruitful works was the International Bible Institute, which he and his wife Judy established in 2000. He recently reported that there have been approximately a half million professions of faith and 2,500 new churches planted as a result of the ministries of its graduates.

For several years, Jim had been inviting me to join his team of teachers in East/Central Africa and teach a course on prayer. This became possible in April 2006 at Brackenhurst, Kenya. Over 100 students were enrolled in my course on prayer. One of the students was Martin George Shikuku, who now leads JGHM: EAST/CENTRAL AFRICA BRANCH. When I was invited to serve as keynote speaker in a major conference in Venezuela, my schedule did not allow me to accept. Although Jim's ministry had never taken him to this part of the world, he served as my substitute and won the hearts of God's people in beautiful **Venezuela**. During that trip, he worked with Adam Nathanson in Caracas in a conference where he taught the book of Revelation. I agree with the late Dr. W.

A. Criswell (First Baptist, Dallas, Texas) that his book on Revelation is at the very top of the list on excellent expositions of this very important book. My well-marked copy was the book I kept beside me each year when Sue and I read Revelation in our "Through-the-Bible" annual reading program. It is now deposited in the Henry Collection in the Hogue Library, Northeastern Baptist College, Bennington, Vermont, along with both our personal libraries.

A few months ago, an announcement was made in Good News. In an article entitled "NOW YOU KNOW." Jim, who was battling cancer, announced that his ministry would be supporting two major ministries. One was a prison ministry and the other our ministry. As he introduced the prayer seminar ministry, he had very kind words of introduction. From that time, a monthly check arrived and his ministry became a Doorkeeper ministry. His Reflector death notice reads "Absent from the body, present with the Lord, Dr. W. Jim Britt, 1948-7/3/2018, Ashburn, Georgia." We join his family, his friends, and countless believers around the world in celebrating the life and ministry of one of God's Giants in our generation, William James Britt, Sycamore, Georgia.

Each month I have looked forward to receiving **Good News** and the information it carried. Above all, I cherish the messages that he shared. If you have never needed the message that we are using as a tribute to our friend, file it away for easy retrieval. Sooner or later, you will need it.



A Heritage of Learning

Cited from Liberty Journal (Liberty University) October-November, 2009



Dr. J. Gordon (Jim) Henry, former teacher, Academic Dean and later Vice President of Academic Affairs at Liberty University, visited campus in June, presenting Chancellor Jerry Falwell, Jr. with several items for the school archives.

Henry was at Liberty from 1972-78 and was instrumental in attaining Liberty's accreditation through the Southern Association of Schools and Universities (SACS), which was received in 1980.

"He was the guy who gave Liberty University academic credibility early on," Falwell said. "He led Liberty to accreditation in record time."

Chancellor Falwell said his father, Liberty University founder Dr. Jerry Falwell, Sr. was "committed to academic excellence from the beginning" and brought Henry on to carry out the task. "[Dad] wasn't just interested in being another unaccredited Bible school," he said.

Henry presented Chancellor Falwell with the school's first purpose and mission statement (which he helped write), a personal letter of "Memories of Dr. Jerry Falwell & Liberty University," the text of his academic dean addresses and his portrait that was used at another institution where he had served.

In the letter, he talked about the first time he met Jerry Falwell, Sr. and Liberty co-founder Elmer Towns.

From his office at a college in Kentucky, "The Holy Spirit brought forth an idea that I should learn more about the new college in Virginia," he writes. "I felt that I should visit Lynchburg and see for myself what God was doing. I attended a Wednesday evening service and met Dr. Elmer Towns. He said that I was the very person that LBC needed to help develop the program.

"Before leaving Lynchburg, Dr. Falwell urged me to join hands with him. I asked two questions: first, 'Do you intend to develop a "real" college?' and 'Will the college attack other believers?' His answers were direct. He said he wanted to be a quality academic program and become known as the 'Harvard' of the evangelical Christian world. He invited me to listen to tapes of his radio/television programs and see for myself that he did not attack other believers.

"I left with a contract that included primary duties to help develop the

academic program that would merit accredited recognition of (SACS) and, especially a teacher education program so that our graduates would be certified to teach in Virginia. Incidentally, Dr. Falwell told me that my salary would be

higher than his salary. He meant business in getting experienced administrators." Mark Hine, Liberty's current Vice President for Student Affairs, was a

student under Henry's leadership. He recalls how Henry would go out of the way to meet students' academic needs.

"He would say in convocations, if we had issues or questions with transcripts, classes for graduation, that he was in his office at 6 a.m. every day and we could go meet with him. I went early one morning. He took my status sheet and looked it over, and was able to help me graduate."

Watching the 2009 Commencement from his Lynchburg home, Henry said he was reminded of Liberty's early graduations; the first four were at Thomas Road Baptist Church, but the fifth was held outside on Liberty Mountain, the future site of the new campus. He writes:

"As we sat there on the platform that beautiful May Sunday afternoon, Dr. Falwell reached over and took my work copy of the Graduation Bulletin in which I had made my organizational notes. He proceeded to write something in my bulletin and handed it back."

Henry presented that bulletin to the chancellor at his June visit. It reads: "To Dr. and Mrs. Jim Henry, Your contribution has helped, probably more

than any other single family, to make LBC a college. I shall be forever grateful.

And Sue your care for Mom will never be forgotten. Jerry Falwell"

(Henry's wife, Sue, took care of Falwell Sr.'s mother as a nurse in the Intensive Care Unit at Virginia Baptist Hospital).

Henry said Falwell, Sr. had wanted him to accept the position of Executive Vice President when it was created, but Henry declined due to his pastorate at a Lynchburg church. But Henry suggested Pierre Guillermin and the choice was made.

Henry left Liberty in 1978 to become president of Northeastern Bible College in New Jersey.

A heart broken for our fractured nation ... Jesus wept over Jerusalem (Matthew 23:37-39)

Most of you hear the same words that I hear. You see what I see. America is a deeply divided nation. Jesus Himself pointed out "a divided house cannot stand." Although He was not addressing a nation at that time, the principle is the same. A nation divided against itself cannot stand.

One recent political figure stated that one group is trying to take away "rights" that are not only contrary to Biblical truths, but to our own constitution and our nation's early history. Many of the issues are in the category of what God has called "abominations." Under the guise of "civil rights" babies are aborted right and left, traditional marriage has been disparaged and "marriage" has been redefined although the legislators in thirty-seven states had passed laws that defined marriage as the union between a man and a woman. Several years ago, I began to say, "I don't believe this could happen in Americal" During an eightyear period, Christianity itself has been attacked. Many of us thought that America has been blessed because we have acknowledged God. Now even the names "God" or "Jesus" are being banned in the public square.

Think of Judah: A nation in deep trouble

Habakkuk, a true patriot, lived in Judah in the years leading up to the fall of Judah to mighty Babylon in 586 BC. As he looked around, he was deeply distressed by the moral and spiritual conditions around him. He loved his nation and knew it was moving closer to the precipice of destruction by continuing to break the laws of God.

The prophet was overwhelmed by what he saw with his own eyes and felt within his onw spirit. Evil men were in control of his beloved nation. Open iniquity abounded. Violence. Law was powerless. Strife. Plundering. God's words were forgotten. He felt God's silence was evidence that He had removed Himself. He wanted to know what God was doing and why.

When God explained what He was about to do--use a nation more evil than Judah to punish them--Habakkuk retired to his watchtower to wait on the LORD and see His answer. He wanted to be alone in order to gain God's perspective. This is a most important principle for believers today. Whether we call it our "Quiet Time," "devotions," or some other term, daily communion with the Lord is crucial for every Christian

Habakkuk was instructed to record God's answer. The answer was to LIVE WITH FAITH IN GOD ALONE while God took care of the situation in His own time.
